In honor of the late Jana Mackey and other victims and survivors of relationship violence, *Jana's Campaign* delivers educational programs that prevent domestic and dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking.

*Jana's Campaign* delivers specialized prevention strategies and curricula designed to prevent violence, build healthy relationships, and create new social norms. Our prevention model works through secondary schools, colleges, and community-based organizations. ## About Jana

On July 3, 2008, Jana Lynne Mackey lost her life to violence perpetrated by an ex-boyfriend in Lawrence, Kansas. The 25-year-old University of Kansas law student was an advocate for women's rights and spent years volunteering to aid victims of sexual assault and domestic violence. As a passionate social and women's activist, Jana fought for equality and social justice at every turn.

Described as "honey on steel," Jana was the kind of woman that inspired others. She inspired through her words, her song, and her actions. In March 2008, Jana attended a Women's Leadership Conference, where she was asked to prioritize her top personal values. Jana identified her most important value as "equality for all persons," and her second most important as "the courage to stand up for her own beliefs." Jana 'walked' her values. With these values, coupled with her years of activism and political experience, Jana believed a law degree was the next step in her journey to become the most effective advocate possible for women and other underrepresented groups.

Jana was beautiful, intelligent, and kind. She was an advocate, a friend, a sister, a daughter. She was magnetic. She was a bright spot in an ordinary day. Jana was a hero. Jana is missed.

The piece includes articles and video interviews compiled by Jennifer Bjorhus, Renée Jones Schneider, Brandon Stahl, and MaryJo Webster. Over the past year, the Star Tribune has examined more than 1,400 rape and sexual assault case files from the 20 law enforcement agencies across Minnesota that reported the highest number of sexual assault reports to the FBI. Because of their unyielding dedication to bringing this injustice to the light, the Star Tribune team held their systems accountable to ensure these survivors receive justice.

All four members of the “Denied Justice” team will present a workshop on Monday, April 8 at 10:00 a.m. Attendees will learn how journalism can be a positive force for change for sexual assault victims, as well as how law enforcement and advocates can help reporters better understand the criminal justice system. The presenters will review what reporters are looking for when deciding what issues to cover, and factors that led to this series rising to the top of the Star Tribune's priorities.

## **BECOMING A MOTHER WAS NOT MY CHOICE: THE DELAYED PROSECUTION OF AN LGBTQ+ RAPE VICTIM** ★

**Michael Crumrine**

This case study will discuss a serial offender who used an alcohol-facilitated sexual assault to prey on an LGBTQ+ person of color, leading to the victim's pregnancy and subsequent birth of her daughter. The presenter will highlight lessons on how to use a variety of investigative tools, such as pretext communications, to successfully investigate a delayed reporting case involving issues ranging from overcoming the consent defense to memory loss of the victim.

## **BRINGING COSBY TO JUSTICE: THE FIRST CONVICTION IN THE #METOO ERA** ★

**Kristen Gibbons Feden, Stewart Ryan, Richard Schaffer**

The first high-profile sexual assault prosecution in the #MeToo era spanned more than three years from the re-opening of the investigation to sentencing. Now, the sexually violent predator sits in a cell. During those three years, there were two trials, scores of motions and hearings, nearly two dozen criminal defense attorneys, and a variety of unique issues related to the presentation of evidence. This case study will focus on some of the most impactful decisions made in the Cosby case, such as reopening the investigation, calling multiple prior victims to testify, the use of experts to dismiss and contextualize common rape myths (especially involving known offenders), the challenges of trying the case twice under an international microscope, and the critical value of having the same detective involved from the first investigation in 2005 all the way through conviction in 2018.

## **CHASING HUBRIS: SEXUAL EXPLOITATION & VIOLENCE IN THE 'PICS OR IT DIDN'T HAPPEN' GENERATION** ★

**Terra Roberts, Rebecca Sommers, Jody Spiegelhoff**

This case study will review the sexual assault of an intoxicated teenage girl by two acquaintances at a house party. The presenters will discuss mistakes by initial responding officers, ongoing interference by offenders, recovering digital evidence, communicating with minor victims, waiver to adult court, search/seizure, destruction of evidence, and appellate issues. This case was a teaching moment for all law enforcement, forensic analysts, victim advocates, and prosecutors involved.

## **I MADE IT A.O.B.: GANGS & PIMPING**

**Jabari Howard, Cara Pierce**

Because human trafficking is low-risk for pimps, and victims are a renewable resource that can be sold over and over again, more gang members are working together to traffic large numbers of women and girls. The presenters will discuss how this generation of gang pimps uses rap music and social media to recruit victims and brag about their pimping.

## **KENNY & KEVIN: INTERNET RAPE** ★

**Bobbie Bruhn, Tracie Reilly**

This case study will examine an extreme "catfishing" case in which a young woman was set up online and in person by a man posing as two different individuals who manipulated and finally extorted her for sex. Attendees will learn how to prove online identities and deal with the potential bias of the criminal justice system in blaming the victim. Presenters will also discuss preparing for a case involving forced "consent" versus actual consent.

## **A LOVE TRIANGLE CONSPIRACY MURDER: UTILIZING TECHNOLOGY & STRATEGY TO SOLVE & PROSECUTE A DOMESTIC MURDER** ★

**Mary Beth Kent-Duffy, Theodore Lagerwall, Scott Lefko**

A pregnant woman is found dead and half naked in a forest, and an exhaustive investigation is conducted with twists and turns which lead to unraveling a conspiracy between a former boyfriend and his girlfriend. This case study will discuss effective police interview techniques, trial strategies behind trying two defendants with a double jury, the effects of gender bias throughout the case, and how to use technology to reconstruct the path to murder.

## **OPERATION HELLBENDER: A LOOK INTO THE DOMESTIC SEX TRADE IN NORTH AMERICA** ★

**David Lane, Melissa Parker**

This case study will examine the 2016 Royal Canadian Mounted Police intel probe of a well-known international gang to determine their level of sophistication and how they operate in order to assess their threat to the North American public. Investigators listened to thousands of intercepts in which female victims described their nightmare and captured the psychological manipulation that these traffickers utilized. This rare insight into victim psychology was eye-opening for investigators and is invaluable knowledge for NGOs for future targeted enforcement.

## SPA REVERSAL OPERATION

**Beau Abdulla, Melanie Jones**

This case study will describe the implementation and result of a major police department taking over an established spa and using it to gather intel and make arrests for prostitution (buying). The investigation led to the arrest of 139 men and 1 female former employee. Attendees will explore a new tactic for targeting the demand side of prostitution and see how successful law enforcement and NGO corroboration can lead to a safe mass arrest operation.

## "THERE'S A METHOD TO MY MADNESS": PREYING ON HER WEAKNESSES

**Ann Duffy, Caitlin Paver**

For years, Rudy Edmonds beat his girlfriend, MJ, almost daily. A master manipulator, Rudy used his self-proclaimed "method to his madness" to trap MJ, who blamed herself and her own alcoholism for the abuse. After one particularly violent attack, MJ agreed to testify against Rudy but continued battling alcoholism and remained in contact with Rudy up until trial. This case study will address an overarching theme of manipulation and show how cases can be made stronger by exposing the predatory dynamics of abusive relationships.

## UBER DRIVER, SERIAL RAPIST: USING DATA MINING SOFTWARE AS A LAW ENFORCEMENT TOOL

**George Duarte, Jeff Richards**

This case study will illustrate how the use of technology and surveillance systems helped detectives break the case of an Uber driver who sexually assaulted a 15-year-old female student. Through the vital use of data mining software to conduct a forensic search of the suspect's phone, investigators were able to identify multiple other victims. The presenters will also discuss the positives that come from having strong partnerships with your community and local businesses.

## WE CAN DO BETTER: STATE OF TEXAS V. GABRIEL ROGERS (LUNCH SESSION)

**Stephanie Martin**

With a history of drug-induced psychosis, Gabriel Rogers spent years tormenting his grandmother, Dorothy, including keeping her prisoner in her own home, stealing from her repeatedly, and physically abusing her. This case study will walk through the many attempts Dorothy made to stop Gabriel and the ways in which the system failed her, highlighting common issues investigators and prosecutors miss.

## WHEN WITNESS PROTECTION IS NOT AN OPTION: RECOURSE FOR VICTIMS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

**Ines Cenatiempo**

This case study will discuss one victim's journey through investigation, prosecution, and appeal of her domestic violence case at the federal level, as well as victim services alternatives that were offered to her following the defendant's unexpected release from custody. The presenter will review the federal prosecution of domestic violence cases and resources available to victims, as well as the applicable statutes used to prosecute these cases under the VAWA and Gun Control Act.

## WHEN YOUR HOSPITAL BECOMES A CRIME SCENE: THE DR. SHEIKH CASE (PT. 1 & 2)

**Jacinda Gunter, Tiffany Larsen, Stacey Mitchell, Janna Oswald**  
Dr. Shafeeq Sheikh raped a hospitalized patient when he was a medical resident. The criminal investigation had many barriers for hospital and law enforcement investigators, including patient history, provider attitudes, and systems barriers. Pt. 1 of this case study will provide a discussion about the case, challenges and strategies to overcoming barriers to sharing information and lessons learned on the way to a conviction for rape. Pt. 2 will discuss collaborative strategies for successful investigations in a healthcare setting.

## LOCATING VICTIMS THROUGH EFFECTIVE STING OPERATIONS

## BLUEPRINT FOR A SAFER FUTURE: CREATING A STATE PLAN TO SUPPORT SURVIVORS OF FAMILY VIOLENCE +

Alexandra Cantrell, Molly Voyles, Leila Wood

Looking to infuse research into services and community collaborations to better meet survivors' needs? This workshop will unpack findings from the Texas State Plan and discuss how a state plan can support efforts in your state and community. The presenters will offer a framework to better understand the needs of survivors and identify gaps across system partners.

## THE BODY NEVER LIES: SOCIAL NEUROSCIENCE & THE EFFECTS OF TRAUMA +

Mischa Peck

When a person experiences trauma, brain reactions range from mild change in cognition to dissociation. Such reactions are survival-based and rudimentary, and qualitatively, they are both functional and dysfunctional. This workshop will introduce the neuroscience of trauma and examine interactions with a traumatized person, providing tactics for building rapport and relationship.

## BODY-WORN CAMERAS: VICTIM- INCLUSIVE POLICIES & PRACTICES +

Meg Garvin, Angela Weekes, John Wilkinson

Law enforcement use of body-worn cameras (BWCs) has increased as public demand for implementation of camera programs have risen. While BWCs can provide evidence in cases involving domestic and sexual violence, their use may also adversely impact victim safety and privacy. This workshop will discuss considerations that criminal justice system practitioners and professionals must keep at the forefront of policy and program development in order to implement effective, victim-centered practices.

## "BUT I'M THE VICTIM!" ASSESSING CLAIMS OF SELF-DEFENSE & OTHER COMMON DEFENSES +

Self-defense, along with related doctrines of defense of others and defense of property, is often falsely claimed by defendants and used to admit alleged prior bad acts of a victim in an attempt to muddy the waters. Attendees will become familiar with these doctrines and ways to counter them.

## THE COMMON DENOMINATOR: TEEN DATING VIOLENCE +

School shootings have shown us that teen dating violence is often the common denominator in "unexplainable" tragedies. This workshop will detail abusive dynamics in teen relationships, discuss ways to talk about dating violence, and explore how to respond to incidents of teen dating violence.

## THE ABCs OF ELDER ABUSE (LUNCH SESSION) +

This workshop will give a broad overview of the investigation and prosecution of elder abuse cases, from physical abuse to financial abuse. The presenter will focus on general principles of elder abuse and discuss how to convert these investigations into prosecutorial action.

# WORKSHOP DESCRIPTIONS

## THE COMPLEX INTERSECTION OF AGING & LONG-TERM INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE +

Faith Brugner

Women stay in abusive relationships for a wide variety reasons, but what happens when the hope for change in their partner turns into 35 years of abuse? This workshop will focus on the barriers for women that are experiencing intimate partner violence later in life, the power and control dynamics that are present, and viewing elder abuse through the lens of power and control.

## COMPLEX PTSD & FIRST CONTACT TRAINING: DOMESTIC SEX TRAFFICKING +

Dennis Mark

This workshop will provide valuable information for law enforcement's first contact with potential victims of domestic sex trafficking from a trauma-informed and brain-based approach. This information will help law enforcement develop skills to realize how trauma affects human trafficking victims, recognize the signs of trauma, respond appropriately to human trafficking victims, and not re-traumatize victims.

## CONDUCTING FINANCIAL INVESTIGATIONS IN HUMAN TRAFFICKING CASES

This workshop will cover best practices for conducting investigations in pursuit of financial charges in concert with traditional human trafficking investigations. ## DECOY OPERATIONS: ADDRESSING DEMAND FOR SEX TRAFFICKING

## DENIED JUSTICE: HOW A MINNESOTA NEWSPAPER EXPOSED WIDESPREAD FAILINGS IN RAPE INVESTIGATIONS

Journalists from the Minneapolis Star Tribune will describe the process and significant impact of their year-long series "Denied Justice", which examined how Minnesota's criminal justice system repeatedly fails sexual assault victims. Attendees will learn how journalism can be a positive force for change and what reporters are looking for when deciding what issues to cover.

## DOMESTIC VIOLENCE HIGH RISK TEAM MODEL: THE BASICS & BEYOND +

The DVHRT Model is a nationally-recognized intimate partner homicide prevention model. Building on the Model's local successes, it has since been replicated in communities throughout the country. This workshop will include a comprehensive overview of the Model, the research at its foundation, and the adaptations and successes other communities nationwide have experienced from its implementation.

## DRUGS AS COERCION: HUMAN TRAFFICKING & TOXICOLOGY +

Dalia Racine

Traffickers often introduce their victims to drugs and alcohol to facilitate their crimes and establish control. Understanding toxicology allows law enforcement, prosecutors, and medical professionals to recognize how drugs and alcohol affect victims' abilities to disclose, participate in the criminal justice system, and process trauma. Attendees will learn to identify drug-facilitated trafficking, provide care, and educate other professionals about the effects of drug use in the context of trafficking dynamics.

## EIGHT COMMON MYTHS ABOUT MEN WHO BATTER: WHY THEY STILL MATTER +

David Adams

The presenter will discuss eight common myths about abusers and how they impede our ability to detect abusers and hold them accountable for their actions. Discussion will include abusers' excuse-making strategies, common deficits as parents, and methods for assessing abuse.

## ELDER ABUSE INVESTIGATIONS: PRACTICAL TOOLS & STRATEGIES +

Ann Laatsch, Jane Walsh

This workshop will focus on the unique aspects of investigating elder abuse cases, including evidence gathering, victim interviewing, cross-systems collaboration, and working with victims who are unwilling or unavailable to assist with the case. The presenters will explore practical strategies and resources available to help communities implement sustainable, multidisciplinary, victim-centered responses to abuse.

## EMPATHY-BASED INTERROGATION (PT. 1 & 2) +

Michael Milnor, Nancy Oglesby

EBI is a method that results in a non-confrontational, conversational tone that will keep suspects talking longer. This workshop will instruct attendees on how to develop corroboration strategies for both investigative leads, and lay the foundation for a prosecutor to develop a strong cross-examination at trial.

## ENGAGING ADMINISTRATION: WHY THEY REALLY NEED TO PAY ATTENTION TO TITLE IX +

This workshop will discuss recent occurrences of university administrators departing from their positions when prior misconduct by university employees is alleged.

## ENHANCING ACCESS TO JUSTICE: IMPROVING SYSTEM RESPONSE TO INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE +

Bethany Backes, Maggy McGiffert, Elyssa Schroeder, Molly Voyles

The criminal justice and child welfare systems are two critical supports to ending IPV, but survivors often face obstacles when accessing them. This workshop will detail research conducted with 150 survivors about barriers to accessing the criminal justice system, experiences with child welfare, and recommendations for improving system responses to IPV.

## ETHICAL INVESTIGATION & PROSECUTION OF SEXUAL ASSAULT CRIMES +

Justin Boardman, Julie Germann

Attendees will engage in an open and real conversation with a former prosecutor and detective to discuss questions that come up during sexual assault cases in the justice system. Time will be allowed for respectful dialogue. The presenters and attendees will think through hard questions and push some boundaries, and figure out how to provide victim-centered justice.

## EXPLORING THE INTERSECTION OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, DISABILITY, & TRAUMA +

Cynthia Amodeo, Jules Perkél

People with disabilities include those with mental health, medical, physical, sensory, cognitive, and developmental conditions. This workshop will focus on the challenges a person with a disability faces when in a domestic violence situation, including barriers to seeking safety and the impact it has on trauma. Attendees will also learn about program modifications to serve domestic violence survivors with disabilities.

### FINDING JENN'S VOICE SCREENING (EVENING)

David Adams, Khara Breeden, Nanette Chezum, Tracy Schott

Finding Jenn's Voice is an award-winning documentary film which examines risk factors of intimate partner homicide. Focusing on the 2011 murder of Jennifer Snyder after she became pregnant, the film examines the characteristics of controlling and coercive relationships. The film will be followed by discussion with a panel of experts.

### FLINT TOWN: COLD CASE SEXUAL ASSAULT IN A MURDER TOWN

Jennifer Janetsky

This workshop will discuss the riveting stories behind Flint, Michigan's untested sexual assault kits: giving voice to the victims of Flint's unspeakable crimes and highlighting how trauma-informed prosecution can heal trauma, restore dignity, and bring justice to victims of sexual assault.

### FORFEITURE BY WRONGDOING: A HIGH-LEVEL TRIAL STRATEGY TO COMBAT WITNESS INTIMIDATION

Dalia Racine, John Wilkinson

Forfeiture by wrongdoing can, when supported by a thorough investigation, blunt the impact of witness intimidation. This workshop will take a deep-dive into the doctrine beyond the basic elements necessary to establish forfeiture, by exploring the details that will allow the prosecutor to make maximum use of this tool. The presenters will include lessons the AEquitas initiative, 'Combating Witness Intimidation.'

### FROM TRAGEDY TO TRIUMPH: ONE FAMILY'S STORY (LUNCH SESSION)

Christie Brungardt, Curt Brungardt

The presenters established Jana's Campaign, Inc. with the single mission of reducing domestic and dating violence, and they believe it is their responsibility to use both the story of their daughter Jana's life and death to enhance their mission. They have worked with thousands of students, educating them on how to recognize healthy and unhealthy relationships.

### FROM VOIR DIRE TO VERDICT: STRATEGIC PROSECUTION OF STRANGULATION-RELATED CRIMES

Kelsey McKay

Strangulation statutes give prosecutors the ability to hold offenders more accountable, but they are often stifled by their misunderstanding of the evidence. By learning how to strategically charge and prosecute these cases, attendees will be able translate valuable evidence to prove these cases beyond a reasonable doubt.

### FRUSTRATIONS OF VICTIMS & SERVICE PROVIDERS: TRAUMATIC BRAIN INJURY, COGNITIVE DISABILITIES, & INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE

Living with a cognitive disability can make one vulnerable to victimization and create barriers to services, but what happens when victimization itself leads to decreased cognitive ability? Brain injury poses a specific threat to victims, making it increasingly difficult to access resources. This workshop will educate on the effects of head injury, heightened lethality risk, and recommendations for safety planning.

### GENDER EXPANSIVE EXPERTISE

Mischa Peck

Gender is assigned based upon birth sex organs, beginning an attachment to a false dichotomy. Gender diversity has always existed. The presenter will provide knowledge and skills to better understand and work with transgender and gender nonconforming persons. Attendees will learn to work with biases and misconceptions and understand ways to engage, support, and assist our diverse gender populations.

### GETTING ON THE SAME PAGE WITH TRAFFICKING SHELTERS

Jeanne Allert

Law enforcement and system advocates may sometimes feel that they are in conflict with shelter operators. This workshop will address how agendas may differ and offers concrete ways that both sides can move closer together. Discussion will include questions referrers should ask prior to placement, how to facilitate communications during placement, and how to create a shared plan for various forms of program exit.

### GOOGLE & ALEXA: WHAT YOU DIDN'T KNOW WAS OUT THERE

Justin Fitzsimmons, Lauren Wagner

With the rise of Digital Assistants (OK Google and Alexa), internet service providers are storing an unbelievable amount of data. Everyone with a Google account has access to a robust history of information through Google Dashboard, My Activity, and Google Takeout. This workshop will address how to access this data and legal considerations associated with Google user data.

### HAPPY LIVES & HEALTHY CAREERS: THRIVING IN PUBLIC SAFETY

Matthew Hagan

This workshop will discuss the dynamics of dealing with traumatic incidents and mentally surviving the aftermath. The presenter will cover setting up peer support teams and how to select team members.

### HELPING SURVIVORS HELP THEMSELVES: SUPPORTING SELF-REPRESENTED SURVIVORS NAVIGATING THE LEGAL SYSTEM (LUNCH SESSION)

Bronwyn Blake

Through the Assisted Pro Se services, survivors work with program advocates and Texas Advocacy Project attorneys to receive legal documents and advice as they represent themselves in court proceedings for divorces, protective orders, or custody and visitation suits. This workshop will discuss best practices and how to duplicate these services in one's community.

### A HOLISTIC APPROACH TOWARDS TRANSLATING TRAUMA (PT. 1 & 2)

Sapana Donde

This workshop will provide a holistic understanding and greater appreciation for why victims of interpersonal violence display the reactions they do during and after experiences of trauma. Attendees will learn how to apply trauma-informed care for these victims in legal and clinical settings.

### HOLISTIC LEGAL ADVOCACY: SUCCESSFULLY OBTAINING CIVIL LEGAL REMEDIES FOR SURVIVORS

Neva Fernandez, Erin Martinson

Attendees will learn the value of an attorney/advocate partnership that integrates victims' rights, safety, and justice into a legal practice. The presenters will share forms for screening for and filing domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking protective orders and for crime victims' assertion of rights.

### HOW BIAS & PREJUDICE PREVENT HELP SEEKING BY SURVIVORS OF COLOR

Gretta Gardner

This workshop will explore the difference between bias and prejudice, as well as how personal and institutional biases impact services to communities of color. Attendees will discuss how VAWA has improved services to communities of color in the past 20 years and what still needs to be done to improve the justice system response and advocacy services for survivors of color.

### HOW TECHNOLOGY-BASED EVIDENCE CAN TURN YOUR INVESTIGATION AROUND

Bryan Franke

Technology is ever-present in many crimes that are committed and investigated in today's world. This workshop will examine several cases in which technology-based evidence either enhanced or changed the direction of the investigation. The focus will be on identifying the benefits obtained by including digital evidence in the overall investigation as well as how to present it.

### A HOW-TO ON BUILDING & SUSTAINING IN-HOUSE CIVIL LEGAL REPRESENTATION (LUNCH SESSION)

Lack of civil legal representation is a significant barrier that can lead many women to remaining in abusive relationships and marriages. Genesis Women's Shelter & Support created an in-house, on-site legal clinic to help remove this roadblock for clients. Join Genesis experts for a discussion on what it takes to fund, develop, and staff in-house legal services.

### HUMAN TRAFFICKING & STRANGULATION

Rachel Fischer, Kelsey McKay

This workshop will discuss the often-missed opportunity to identify the co-occurrence of strangulation, suffocation, and drowning in human trafficking cases where there is a layered risk of frequent and repeated forms of asphyxiation of victims by the pimp and the john. Despite the severe traumatic impact, screening tools fail to capture the existence and effect of this type of assault.

### I TAKE IT BACK: INVESTIGATING RECANTATIONS

Myra Strand, Russell Strand

Recantations by the reporting victim are common and affect the case's investigation and prosecution; however, a case determination should not be made until a proper investigation of the recantation has been conducted. This workshop will assist criminal justice professionals in understanding many of the dynamics surrounding recantations and discuss investigative techniques to determine if the recantation itself is true or false.

# WORKSHOP DESCRIPTIONS

## **I WATCH FROM THE SHADOWS: WORKING WITH CHILDREN WHO ARE IMPACTED BY VIOLENCE** ⚡+

This workshop will analyze how a traumatic event is understood by child victims and how to apply specific interview techniques that lead to richer interview narratives. Additional recommendations to improving filing and prosecution outcomes will include tools for working with underserved populations and suggestions for implementing a collaborative team approach for working with caregivers and children.

## **THE IMPACT OF TRAUMA ON BLACK WOMEN'S CRIMINALIZATION: TRAUMA-INFORMED APPROACHES TO IMPROVING COMMUNITY RESPONSE** ⚡

**Afuja Addo, Carlotta Walcott**

This workshop will discuss trauma-informed strategies for engaging justice-involved Black female survivors of domestic and sexual violence. The presenters will also provide lessons learned from the Center for Court Innovation's work on Project SAFE, an initiative that addresses the intersections of trauma, race, gender, and sexuality, and has worked to improve services and community response to this population.

## **IN HER SHOES: LIVING WITH DOMESTIC VIOLENCE** ⚡

This interactive simulation is designed for attendees to experience firsthand the hurdles and roadblocks that teen survivors of domestic and dating violence face. Attendees will build empathy and understanding for the adolescent realities of trying to live a life free from violence and abuse.

## **IN OUR BACKYARD: LEGAL & CLINICAL INSIGHTS ON FORCED MARRIAGE & FEMALE GENITAL MUTILATION** ⚡

**Mariama Diallo, Bushra Husain**

Survivors of forced marriage and FGM suffer from significant physical and psychological trauma as children or young adults due to abuse by their families. Attendees will gain insight into the power and control dynamics, tactics, and warning signs present in forced marriage and FGM situations, best practices, and the role of social workers to expand protections.

## **IN THE SUSPECT'S OWN WORDS: COMBATING THE CONSENT DEFENSE**

**Michael Crumrine, Kim Farbo**

In non-stranger sexual assault cases, sometimes the best and only evidence is what the suspect provides in their own words. This workshop will give attendees the foundation for successfully investigating and prosecuting non-stranger sexual assault and will provide techniques for overcoming the "consent defense" by utilizing electronic evidence correctly.

## **INCREASING VICTIM & OFFICER SAFETY: ASSESSING THREATS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PERPETRATORS (PT. 1 & 2)**

**Doug Burig, Mark Wynn**

Domestic violence calls are inherently challenging for responding officers, and the relationship between perpetrators of domestic violence and officers killed in the line of duty is indisputable. The presenters will highlight effective agency policies that should be in place to ensure that domestic violence complaints are properly documented, cases are fully investigated, and offenders are held accountable.

## **INITIAL MANAGEMENT OF SOCIAL MEDIA & MOBILE DEVICES FOR DOMESTIC VIOLENCE INVESTIGATIONS** ⚡

**Colin Fagan**

This workshop will provide attendees with essential information to properly identify and collect potential sources of digital evidence, social media, and related network data. Proper management of this data can greatly improve outcomes in violence against women investigations and prosecutions.

## **INSTITUTE FOR COORDINATED COMMUNITY RESPONSE OVERVIEW (LUNCH SESSION)**

**CCAW Staff**

This lunch session is relevant to rural Texas counties only. Learn more about the Institute for Coordinated Community Response (ICCR), CCAW's new free, year-long training institute for rural Texas counties who are seeking to improve their systemic response to domestic violence through the creation of a Coordinated Community Response. Six teams of three—a law enforcement officer, prosecutor, and victim advocate—will be selected to participate each year.

## **INTERACTIVE DOMESTIC VIOLENCE CRIME SCENE (PT.1 & 2)** ⚡

**Ray Goins, Ronnie Johnson**

In this workshop, attendees will watch a scenario of a domestic violence incident and then be put in the shoes of the responding officers on the scene. Attendees will also interact with and interview the parties related to the incident. In addition, the presenters will complete a crime scene investigation of the incident.

## **THE INTERSECTION OF INTERPERSONAL VIOLENCE & PREGNANCY** ⚡

**Khara Breeden, Kelsey McKay**

Pregnancy becomes a complicated subject within the many intersections of violence against women. This workshop will discuss several of these intersections, including the impact of pregnancy, or even the threat of pregnancy, on victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, and human trafficking.

## **INTIMATE PARTNER HOMICIDE: SOLVING COLD CASES WITH AN EVIDENCE-BASED INTERVIEW STRATEGY** ⚡

**Mike Krapfl**

This workshop will examine the ins-and-outs of a proven evidence-based interview strategy. Using a real life case example, the presenter will discuss how enhanced cognitive interview skills, social influence techniques, and overcoming minimal physical evidence can be used to find justice for victims and their families.

## **INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE & DIGITAL ABUSE** ⚡

**Bronwyn Blake, Amanda Elkanick Oder**

In an age when it is easier than ever for abusers to use technology and communication tools to control, stalk, and harass victims, it is important for community members to understand how the law defines these crimes. This workshop will identify the laws and remedies available to protect survivors and discuss practices for safety planning around technology.

## **INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE & MILITARY SEXUAL TRAUMA IN VETERAN TREATMENT COURTS** ⚡

**Amanda Elkanick Oder**

VTCs provide invaluable resources and treatment for veterans suffering from PTSD, Traumatic Brain Injury, and other mental health issues as a result of their service. This workshop will focus on best practices for accepting these cases into VTCs, consideration of survivors through this process, and national and state resources.

## **INTRO TO BASIC TACTICAL MEDICINE** ⚡+

**Jennifer Waindle**

In this workshop, attendees will be introduced to situations they may encounter in their work and personal life and "what if" active threat scenarios. The techniques and tools recommended for various injury scenarios will address treating life-threatening injuries in an environment with limited equipment and medically-trained personnel.

## **INVESTIGATING & COLLABORATING ON CASES OF LABOR TRAFFICKING**

Cases of labor trafficking are much more hidden than sex trafficking. Finding and investigating these cases is extremely challenging. With presenters from both the victim services and law enforcement fields, this workshop will provide examples of methods of investigation and the need for collaboration between various agencies.

## **INVESTIGATING & PROSECUTING PHYSICAL & FINANCIAL ELDER ABUSE (PT.1 & 2)** ⚡+

Being able to identify that physical and/or financial abuse within the elderly population has been committed takes an investigative mind. The presenters will focus on common schemes and frauds, how to present financial abuse cases in the courtroom, and how to advocate for victims dealing with financial crime. They will also walk attendees through the victim-centered approaches in the updated "Taking Action: An Advocates Guide to Assisting Victims of Financial Fraud."

## INVESTIGATING & PROSECUTING STALKING IN TRIBAL COMMUNITIES

American Indian/Alaska Natives (AIAN) experience stalking at higher rates than any other ethnic or demographic group in the U.S. In tribal communities, a response to stalking is complicated because of jurisdictional issues to investigating and prosecuting the crime. This workshop will address Indian Country criminal jurisdiction, stalking laws, victim safety, developing a multijurisdictional response, and tools for investigating and prosecuting these crimes.

## INVESTIGATING AQUATIC CRIMES AGAINST WOMEN & HOMICIDAL DROWNINGS (PT. 1 & 2)

"Body found in water" cases are some of the most misdiagnosed deaths worldwide. More than 80% of adult victims are women. Unfortunately, law enforcement and death investigators are rarely trained in aquatic homicides and aquatic torture. This workshop will provide attendees with the basics of aquatic death and torture investigations with adult female victims.

## INVESTIGATING STRANGULATION & SUFFOCATION CRIMES

**Kelsey McKay**

Strangulation laws in most states recognize the significance of this form of violence; however, without a plan to implement sustainable training and protocols, these offenders will not be held accountable. Through the use of a strangulation supplement, attendees will learn to develop credible evidence to overcome common challenges and defenses.

## ISLAM, DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, & UNIQUE CONSIDERATIONS WHEN DEALING WITH MUSLIM VICTIMS

**Omar Suleiman**

This workshop will provide an in-depth view of Islam's perspective on domestic violence from numerous angles. Attendees will look at common misconceptions as well as Islamic prescriptions for dealing with physical and emotional violence towards women. The presenter will also discuss unique considerations when dealing with Muslim victims and how to support Muslim women in abusive marriages.

## JUSTICE FOR ALL: CULTURALLY SENSITIVE RESPONSES TO MINORITY VICTIMS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

This workshop will highlight cultural barriers that African-American, Hispanic, South Asian, and Middle Eastern domestic violence victims face as they navigate the criminal justice system. Attendees will examine their biases as it relates to certain minority victim populations, understand the importance of litigating protective orders, and discuss the importance of culturally-specific advocacy within these underserved communities.

## THE KAVANAUGH EFFECT

#MeToo, Weinstein, Cosby, and Kavanaugh have brought the spotlight to sexual harassment, sex assault, and the handling of these matters by the criminal justice system and beyond. The presenter will discuss the impact of the Weinstein allegations, Cosby's charge and conviction, the #MeToo movement, and other high profile sexual misconduct allegations on investigations, charging, pre-trial preparation, and trying these cases.

## KNOW MORE, DO MORE: IDENTIFYING & RESPONDING TO STALKING CRIMES

Victims of stalking often report feeling discounted by the systems designed to assist them. Despite the prevalence of stalking—a crime affecting some 6-7.5 million people at some time in their lives—law enforcement is often hampered by lack of training and resources to address the crime of stalking in a comprehensive manner. Attendees will learn ways to identify and respond to stalking either as a stand-alone issue or as it intersects with domestic violence and sexual assault.

## LAW ENFORCEMENT NETWORKING LUNCH

Join fellow law enforcement professionals for networking and an open discussion on current "hot topics" in your various fields.

## LAW ENFORCEMENT'S ROLE IN SUPPORTING CRIME VICTIM ACCESS TO COMPENSATION

Law enforcement plays an important role in supporting crime victims' access to victim compensation. As first responders, investigators, and executives, law enforcement can ensure victims receive information about financial assistance programs. ## LIGHTNING SESSION: FIVE SEXUAL ASSAULT TOPICS IN 90 MINUTES

People working crimes against women see and hear many things they would rather not. These memories can have a disturbing effect on professionals and their families. The presenter will explain what is behind the secondary trauma of working these cases and will provide simple but effective steps we can take to help us live with these stories and images.

## MAN2MAN: A CONVERSATION WITH MEN ABOUT GENDER VIOLENCE

**Curt Brungardt**

Sharing the story of his step-daughter, Jana Mackey, a 25-year-old who was murdered at the hands of her ex-boyfriend in 2008, the presenter calls on men and boys to be part of the solution for gender-based violence. This workshop will discuss the roots of violence against women: fundamental conditions of gender inequality and the harmful aspects of masculinity.

## A MATTER OF LIFE & DEATH: REPORTING PROTECTIVE ORDERS & MISDEMEANOR CRIMES OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

The November 5, 2017 mass shooting in Sutherland Springs demonstrated the consequences that can result from the lack of proper reporting of misdemeanor crimes of domestic violence. This workshop will explore obstacles to reporting and potential strategies for ensuring that these crimes and protective orders are included in the systems that are designed to keep firearms out of abusers' hands.

## MEDICAL NETWORKING LUNCH

## MENTAL HEALTH DIAGNOSIS 101: A BEGINNER'S GUIDE TO COMMON MENTAL HEALTH DISORDERS & THEIR RELATIONSHIP TO TRAUMA

This workshop will provide insightful strategies to help attendees cultivate basic understandings of major depressive disorder, bipolar disorder, schizophrenia, and schizoaffective disorder from DSM-V criteria. ## MILITARY MARRIAGES & COMBAT: UNSPOKEN THREATS THAT COMPROMISE THE "HAPPY" REUNION

When military families reunite, unacknowledged anxiety, mistrust, miscommunication, fear, and behavioral health issues can lead to conflict and, sometimes, violence. ## MILITARY RELATED CO-OCCURRING CONDITIONS WITH INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE

Substance abuse, depression, PTSD, and traumatic brain injury are common among veterans, and are often seen as contributing factors to intimate partner violence. However, without background knowledge, accurate screening, and being able to distinguish between symptoms of these conditions, IPV tactics can lead to incorrect intervention and a decrease in victim safety. This workshop will review common veteran conditions, and how they intersect with IPV.

# WORKSHOP DESCRIPTIONS

## **MINDFULNESS FOR SART & CCR TEAMS** 🗡️ +

**Justin Boardman**

This workshop will discuss some options to help attendees see their trauma and secondary trauma. Attendees will discuss what this can look like as a dysfunction and how it can be prevented, for the team and victims' benefit. Throughout this workshop, attendees will practice different exercises so they may have new tools to take back to their teams.

A case study will highlight the challenges in the search for the missing and resources that can assist communities.

## **MISSING YOU: THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN MASS HOMICIDES & DOMESTIC VIOLENCE (PT. 1 & 2)**

When we think of "mass homicide", we often flash back to the events of 9/11, the Pulse Nightclub in Orlando, and more. The correlation of subjects with a domestic violence history and those who commit mass homicide is over 50%. This workshop will take a close look at who is perpetrating these massacres, why, and what can be done to prevent these crimes.

## **MOBILE SPYWARE: IS IT THERE?**

Have you ever wondered if a device was infected with spyware? This concern is common for many people impacted by domestic violence. This workshop will provide information on common spyware applications, and how to check devices for their presence.

## **THE MOST DANGEROUS POWER OF THE PROSECUTOR** 🗡️

How is the power of the prosecutor wielded when it comes to sexual assault cases? The standard often cited by prosecutors is "would a jury in my jurisdiction convict?" This standard often leads to charging decisions that are led by bias and stereotypes. After this workshop, attendees will be better able to identify standards for charging that eliminate gender bias.

## **NETIZENS SCREENING (EVENING)**

## **NEW DEVELOPMENTS IN FEDERAL POLICY TOWARD DOMESTIC VIOLENCE ASYLUM SEEKERS** 🗡️

Last summer, former Attorney General Jeff Sessions issued an opinion that limited the ability of women fleeing domestic violence to obtain asylum in the U.S. This workshop will explain these new developments in asylum jurisprudence and provide guidance for advocates seeking to assist immigrant survivors of intimate partner abuse.

## **NEW DEVELOPMENTS IN SEXUAL ASSAULT PREVENTION EFFORTS: WHY PRIMARY PREVENTION & RISK REDUCTION MATTER** 🗡️

Most sexual assault prevention efforts focus exclusively on primary prevention programs. Recent research suggests, however, that risk reduction strategies have an equally important role to play in prevention. ## **NEW PROPOSED TITLE IX REGULATIONS & THEIR EFFECT ON YOUR CAMPUS** 🗡️

On November 16, 2018, the Department of Education released its long-awaited notice of proposed rulemaking for Title IX. The proposed regulations, if adopted, would substantially revise key aspects of the Title IX investigation and determination process.

## **NO EASY TASK: DRAFTING ENFORCEABLE TRIBAL PROTECTION ORDERS** 🗡️

This workshop will address jurisdictional findings, domestic violence findings, and tailoring the remedies of a tribal protection order to fit the needs of the petitioner. The workshop will also discuss enforceability issues and promising strategies around the enforcement of tribal protection orders.

## **"NO FACE, NO CASE": RESPONDING TO WITNESS INTIMIDATION DURING INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE INVESTIGATIONS** 🗡️

Witness intimidation is one of the most common reasons that cases do not proceed through the criminal justice system. Attendees will learn strategies offenders use to compel victims to recant, what other forms of evidence can be collected to ensure successful case outcomes, and how post-arrest investigation can be used to levy charges of witness intimidation.

## **NOT JUST A CIVIL MATTER: COMBATING & PROSECUTING THE SYSTEM-SAVVY STALKER** 🗡️

Using real case investigation examples of how suspects use legal and public processes to threaten, stalk, and hurt their victims, this workshop will demonstrate how to sift through records to make a stalking case out of something otherwise deemed "civil." Traits of the system-savvy stalker, and the importance of advocates, police response, and private security partners in these cases will be discussed.

## **NOT JUST FEELING WORDS: HOW VICTIM SERVICES CAN LEAD TO SUCCESS IN LAW ENFORCEMENT**

This workshop will offer firsthand accounts of the value and importance of a trauma-informed and victim-centered approach to policing, the wide-ranging contributions that Victim Services can make in a police department and the lives of the people it serves, and how this powerful combination can contribute to the effective implementation of Community Policing.

## **NOW WHAT? TURNING TRAUMA-INFORMED KNOWLEDGE INTO PRACTICE** +

## **ONLINE DATING & GAMING: KNOWING THE RISKS & STAYING SAFE**

This workshop will discuss the growing trend of online dating, hook-up apps, and gaming. The presenters will explain how harassment, threats, and harm in these platforms cross over into "real life." The workshop will also explore privacy and safety strategies in these spaces.

## **OPEN SOURCE SOCIAL MEDIA SEARCHES LAW ENFORCEMENT & PROSECUTORS SHOULD KNOW** 🗡️

Social media is a common part of everyday life, so it is not surprising that evidence from social media is central to investigations. The presenters will detail how social media searches can be used to enhance the investigation and prosecution of cases.

## **OVERVIEW OF THE FORENSIC EXPERIENTIAL TRAUMA INTERVIEW (PT. 1 & 2)** 🗡️ +

This workshop will provide an overview of the official Forensic Experiential Trauma Interview™, a science and practice-based interviewing methodology informed by the latest research on the neurobiology of trauma and memory. Attendees will learn and understand the FETI Framework™, as well as recognize the impact and science-basis of trauma and high-stress on memory, communication, and recall.

## OVW GRANT PROGRAMS & FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES (LUNCH SESSION)

Attendees will learn about the Office on Violence Against Women and what funding is available to support efforts addressing domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, and stalking. OVW staff will provide attendees with an overview of available discretionary and formula program funding, and share information about project activities supported by OVW grant funds. Attendees will also have an opportunity to ask questions.

## OVW TRIBAL AFFAIRS DIVISION: ADDRESSING THE ISSUES OF VIOLENCE AGAINST AMERICAN INDIAN & ALASKA NATIVE WOMEN (LUNCH SESSION)

Bring your lunch and enjoy this networking discussion about how the OVW Tribal Affairs Division (TAD) implements the VAWA statute and responsibilities imparted to it when addressing domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, stalking, and sex trafficking in Indian country. Attendees will be provided an overview of the TAD grant programs, technical assistance projects, policy and legislation, and special initiatives.

## PEEP BEHIND THE CURTAIN: PORN & ITS IMPACT ON INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE

This workshop will examine the influence of pornography on the neurobiology of the developing and already-developed brain. The presenters will seek to articulate that excessive porn use impacts an individual's sexuality and body image, taking into consideration that the onslaught of hardcore images shape and inform one's sexual identity and practice.

## PROSECUTING PIMPS: STEPS TO A SUCCESSFUL PROSECUTION

Solid investigations of human trafficking cases lead to successful prosecutions. This workshop will assist prosecutors and investigators who are tackling human trafficking cases, from initial investigation to post-conviction. A multidisciplinary team approach between law enforcement, victim advocates, and prosecutors allows for simultaneous goals of rescuing victims and prosecuting their offenders to the fullest extent.

## PROSECUTING THE MANIPULATIVE, COERCIVE DEFENDANT: HOW NOT TO MAKE THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM ANOTHER TOOL IN THE ABUSER'S TOOLBOX

Family violence offenders manipulate the criminal justice system and make it harder for victims to reach help. Investigators and prosecutors must be vigilant or the criminal justice system can easily become another tool used to batter the victim. This workshop will provide real case examples and methods that can be employed to prevent these manipulators from derailing justice.

## PROSECUTING THE PSYCHOPATHIC SEX OFFENDER

Psychopathic sex offenders present a special kind of risk to our communities, and prosecuting them poses a special kind of challenge. Through the use of video clips and offender statements, this workshop will help practitioners identify psychopathic traits and equip law enforcement with tools to help prosecute these unique offenders.

## PROTECTING & SERVING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SURVIVORS IN THE BLACK COMMUNITY: CHALLENGES & SOLUTIONS (LUNCH SESSION)

### Gretta Gardner

*\*Restricted to law enforcement.\** Attendees will engage in a dialogue about the help-seeking challenges Black survivors experience and the difficulties law enforcement officers face in responding to domestic violence in the Black community. The presenter will use these conversations as a springboard to create culturally-responsive approaches based on mutual respect and effective communication.

## PROTECTING YOURSELF IN A DIGITAL WORLD

### Jim Tanner

Digital devices are a part of the modern world. The presenter will discuss the technical problems everyone faces each time they log into their computer, use a smart phone, or swipe a credit card. Attendees will learn what to do to protect themselves from digital criminal acts.

## RECOGNIZING, RESPONDING TO, & REPORTING TRAFFICKING IN THE HEALTHCARE SETTING

### Carrie Shirato, Carrie Taylor

Research shows that up to 88% of sex trafficking survivors have contact with healthcare providers, but low percentages of victims are identified. This workshop will discuss one organization's newly-developed, trauma-informed training to not only recognize human trafficking victims, but to equip and empower providers with the necessary tools to respond to and report these trafficked persons safely and efficiently.

## RESPONDING TO CLERY COMPLIANCE PROGRAM REVIEWS

Complaints that institutions fail to address sexual misconduct allegations can trigger U.S. Department of Education Clery compliance program reviews. This workshop will discuss preparing for a potential review, responding to notice that your institution will be the subject of one, and resolving outcomes effectively.

## RIVER OF CRUELTY: AN EXPERIMENTAL APPROACH TO UNDERSTANDING & INTERVENING WITH CRUELTY

### Steve Halley, Dorthy Stucky Halley

Cruel behaviors on campus pose serious problems for college administrators, staff, and students. Using the Family Peace Initiative's "River of Cruelty Map," attendees will explore the impact of trauma and adverse experiences on human behavior using an experimental approach. This workshop will demonstrate how cruel experiences are often transferred from person to person and generation to generation.

## THE ROLE OF FAITH COMMUNITIES IN ADDRESSING CRIME, DELINQUENCY, DRUG ADDICTION, DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, & OFFENDER REHABILITATION

When compared to current strategies, faith-based approaches to crime prevention bring added value in targeting factors known to cause crime: poverty, lack of education, and unemployment. This workshop will describe how faith communities, congregations, and faith-based organizations are essential in forming partnerships necessary to provide the human and spiritual capital needed to effectively address crime, offender rehabilitation, prisoner re-entry, and domestic violence.

## SAFER GUIDE: ASSESS & ADDRESS DOMESTIC VIOLENCE IN CUSTODY DECISIONS & FAMILY COURT (LUNCH SESSION)

Developed for family court, the SAFeR approach promotes IPV-informed decision making by guiding the practitioner through four steps: screening for IPV; assessing the context of the IPV; focusing on the effects of IPV; and responding to IPV in all interventions. In this workshop, attendees will discover how to better assess and address domestic violence in any court setting via the SAFeR tools.

## SECURING YOUR ROUTER & WIFI NETWORK (LUNCH SESSION)

### Bryan Franke

Have you ever wondered if your WiFi is secure? Is someone using it without your knowledge? Could you be implicated in a criminal investigation because of it? If you answered "yes" to any or all of these, this workshop is for you. Learn how to better secure your network to protect you and your family.

## SEIZING THE OPPORTUNITY: CROSS-EXAMINATION OF THE DEFENDANT IN CURRENT & COLD CASES OF SEXUAL ASSAULT

### Kristen Gibbons Feden, Patricia Powers

When sexually-violent defendants take the stand, the prosecutor is afforded the opportunity to expose the defendant's true character. This workshop will discuss the importance of preparing a strategy for cross-examination at the earliest stages of trial preparation, reviewing evidence, listening to the defendant's testimony on direct, revealing the defendant's character through questioning, and exposing the defendant's predatory behaviors.

# WORKSHOP DESCRIPTIONS

## SEX OFFENDER POLICIES & MANAGEMENT ✨

Melissa Hamilton

Sex offender policies, management, and treatment are often driven by myths and public fears rather than scientific research. In this workshop, attendees will unpack common myths and become familiar with the best evidence about sex offending, techniques of investigation, and supervision strategies.

## SEX, STRANGULATION, & SERIAL KILLERS (PT. 1 & 2) ✨

Julie Germann, Kelsey McKay

Perpetrators' torturous use of sexual violence and strangulation identifies them as the most depraved offenders. With training to identify these offenders, properly collect evidence, and strategically charge and prosecute, communities can elevate their role in holding offenders accountable. This workshop will provide practical tools that the criminal justice community can implement to improve accountability for the most lethal offenders.

## SEXUAL ASSAULT & MENTAL ILLNESS: DEVELOPING A STRONG MEDICAL, ADVOCACY, & LEGAL RESPONSE ✨+

Caroline Adams, Brian Baker, Nancy Downing, Patricia Marty

Attendees will examine the relationship between mental illness and sexual assault, as well as strategize ways to provide a strong medical, advocacy, and legal response. Persons with mental illness are often considered less credible victims. This workshop will provide strategies for responding to victims with various challenging mental disorders to build a strong case to prosecute crimes against them.

## SEXUAL DEVIANT KILLERS ✨+

Lawrence Simon

This workshop will offer a comprehensive examination into the deviant minds of individuals who mask extraordinary dangerous sexual obsessions and act on those urges. The presenter will emphasize the psychology behind the crime while analyzing and interpreting true accounts of some of the most dangerous men behind bars.

## SEXUAL MISCONDUCT: NAVIGATING THE STUDENT EXPERIENCE ✨➡+

Karla Arenas-Itotia, Kiva Harper

This workshop will discuss campus culture and best practices when working with survivors of relationship and sexual violence, with a focus on student survivors. Discussion will include: education, advocacy, support services, trauma-informed practices, policy, reporting, coordination of services ranging from academic accommodations to medical, and more.

## SHIFTING THE PARADIGM: HOW ON-SCENE LAW ENFORCEMENT & ADVOCACY COLLABORATION MAKES A DIFFERENCE

Jason Forgash, Michelle Heater

This workshop will share a current model of on-scene response that strategically integrates law enforcement and victim services. The presenters will demonstrate how the critical needs of the victim are addressed and how this approach leads to more positive case outcomes.

## STALKING IN THE DIGITAL AGE: KNOW IT, NAME IT, PROSECUTE IT ✨

Jane Anderson, Jennifer Landhuis

Too often, reports of stalking are taken seriously only after the stalkers escalate their behaviors. This workshop will examine dynamics, elements of the offense, and considerations in charging stalking. The presenters will also discuss the correlation between stalking and other forms of violence, interviewing techniques, the use of technology in stalking, and the importance of a collaborative approach.

## A STEP AHEAD: TEXAS' RESPONSE TO SAK REFORM (LUNCH SESSION) ✨+

Rebecca Vieh

Texas rape kit reform laws have required the Texas Department of Public Safety Crime Laboratory Service to develop and implement several programs related to sexual assault cases. This workshop will identify the six legislative pillars for reform, review the laboratory's response to Texas' sexual assault legislation, and include a brief overview of the proposed sexual assault evidence tracking system.

## STREET GANGS, THEN & NOW ✨

Evonne Garcia, Andrea Schooler

This workshop will track the history of nationally-known criminal street gangs, and focuses heavily on the violence they perpetrate against women and girls. The presenters will address current gang trends, while focusing on the role of women and girls in gangs, sexual abuse, sex trafficking, and some of the ways in which young people are indoctrinated into this way of life.

## SUFFER FROM BURNOUT? GIVE 'EM THE F.I.N.G.E.R.! ✨

Burnout affects millions of Americans each year and has been called "the disease of our civilization." Attendees will learn the definition of Burnout and the symptoms thereof. More importantly, attendees will be laughing and learning how to apply the F.I.N.G.E.R. philosophy to help themselves or their co-workers avoid and/or recover from Burnout.

## SUPPORTING LGBTQ+ SURVIVORS ON CAMPUS ✨

Ethan Levine, Molly Sapia

This workshop will explore strategies for addressing sexual violence in lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans, and queer (LGBTQ+) communities. How can professionals improve support for LGBTQ+ students? How effectively does Title IX address same-sex violence, and what other policies and programmatic supports are available? Attendees will discuss and strategize around these and other challenges for supporting LGBTQ+ survivors on campus.

## SURRENDERING FIREARMS, SAVING LIVES ✨

Julie Germann, David Keck

The most dangerous time for a domestic violence victim is immediately after leaving the relationship. Research has shown that prohibiting persons subject to protection orders from possessing firearms and requiring surrender of their firearms is associated with a reduced rate of intimate partner homicide. In this workshop, attendees will learn how to develop a firearm surrender protocol in their community.

## THE TEN COMMANDMENTS OF FAMILY VIOLENCE ✨

Melissa Carter, Jessica Escue

Reluctant witnesses, recanting victims, and distrust of authorities are hallmarks of family violence investigations. Because of those factors, domestic violence cases are often frustrating and difficult to investigate and prosecute. This workshop will focus on 10 practical steps that can make or break a family violence case.

## TEXAS SEXUAL ASSAULT EVIDENCE COLLECTION PROTOCOL UPDATE (LUNCH SESSION) ✨

Laurie Charles

This workshop will review the recently updated, legislatively-mandated Texas Sexual Assault Evidence Collection Protocol. This workshop is appropriate for any medical, nursing, emergency services, law enforcement, advocacy, attorneys, and forensic science personnel who interact with persons who experience sexual violence.

## THERE'S AN APP FOR THAT: TECH MISUSE & STRATEGIES FOR SAFETY & PRIVACY

Audace Garnett, Rachel Gibson

This workshop will provide information and tools to recognize how specific apps might be misused by abusers. The presenters will answer common questions about current popular apps and discuss what steps survivors can take to safely use apps and increase their safety and privacy. The presenters will also give an overview of considerations for the development of apps for survivors.

## "THEY'RE DOING WHAT?" DEFAMATION LAWSUITS FILED BY THE ACCUSED IN TITLE IX ✨

Amy Pennington, Thomas Pennington

This workshop will explain the law regarding defamation and will explore recent cases where individuals accused of Title IX violations have subsequently filed defamation lawsuits.

## TRAFFICKING IN INDIAN COUNTRY

Chris Bray

This workshop will familiarize attendees with sex trafficking in Native American communities. The presenter will discuss how trafficking manifests in Indian Country, and will provide insight on the victims and perpetrators of this crime. This workshop will also discuss the indicators of trafficking, the behaviors of those directly involved in the crime, and strategies for engaging communities to augment resources.

## TRANSLATING DOUBT INTO CONVICTION THROUGH THE STRATEGIC USE OF EXPERT WITNESS (PT. 1 & 2) ✨

Margaret Bassett

This workshop will provide guidance on when and how to use expert witnesses to help the criminal justice system, attorneys, and fact finders view interpersonal crimes through the correct filter necessary to turn "weaknesses" into evidence of a crime. Attendees will develop strategies to address common themes, safety, and risk assessment.

## TRAUMA-INFORMED VICTIM INTERVIEW FOR THE JUSTICE SYSTEM ☆ +

Justin Boardman

This workshop will briefly review the basics of the neurobiology of trauma and show areas of a victim experience to interview around. Basic questions will be explained and shown in real interviews. The presenter will review an interview guideline and provide attendees tools to implement in their communities.

## TRIBAL SPECIAL ASSISTANT U.S. ATTORNEY INITIATIVE

Leslie A. Hagen, Rebekah Jones

This workshop will discuss the TSAUSA initiative to support the cross-designation of tribal prosecutors to bring domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, and sex trafficking cases in both tribal and federal court. TSAUSAs help ensure greater accountability for offenders by increasing prosecutions of habitual offenders and strengthening mutual trust among tribal organizations and the U.S. attorney's offices working in partnership with tribes.

## THE ULTIMATE ACT OF POWER & CONTROL: OVERCOMING COMMON DEFENSES IN DOMESTIC VIOLENCE HOMICIDE CASES ☆

Kristen Gibbons Feden, Dalia Racine, John Wilkinson

Domestic violence homicide is rarely a "whodunit"; issues at trial typically center on whether the defendant should be afforded a complete defense or mitigation, reducing the crime to a lesser offense. This workshop will propose strategies to anticipate and counter common defenses in domestic violence homicide prosecution, as well as ways to counter "non-defenses" such as jury nullification or attempts to impugn the victim's character.

## UNDERSTANDING PROTECTIVE ORDERS (LUNCH SESSION) ☆

Bronwyn Blake

This workshop will examine the different types of protective orders available to survivors of domestic and dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking both in Texas and nationally. The presenter will describe how they work and can be utilized to improve survivor safety and prevent future violence.

## THE UNNAMED CONSPIRATOR ☆

Anne Munch

Commonly held beliefs about victims, offenders, and the meaning of consent all play important roles in how sexual assault cases are understood and handled in our culture. This workshop will examine the influences on children, jurors, and members of our communities as they consider the question of sexual assault and what it means.

## USING FEDERAL LAW TO INCREASE SAFETY FOR INDIAN WOMEN: TLOA & VAWA

Leslie A. Hagen

Recent federal statutes (TLOA and VAWA) potentially and dramatically changed the legal authority of tribal courts and have provided federal prosecutors with new criminal offenses to use when holding offenders accountable. This workshop will cover relevant changes to federal law, a summary of recent case law, and an update on implementation efforts for both Acts.

## VICTIM BLAMING & RETALIATION: THE SECOND RAPE ☆

Anne Munch

This workshop will explore the dynamics at play when rape victims are blamed for crimes committed against them and the tension that we face when presented with the "two-sided coin" that depicts victim blaming on one side and offender accountability on the other.

## WE'RE WATCHING: MONITORING & SUPERVISING STALKING OFFENDERS

Jennifer Landhuis

Almost 1 in 3 stalkers have stalked previously and over 50% of stalkers re-offend. This workshop will help attendees identify and respond to behaviors that are part of the course of conduct in stalking crimes. The presenter will also discuss the importance of stalking-specific risk assessments, conducting regular searches, and considering special conditions of supervision for stalking offenders.

## WHAT DIGITAL BREADCRUMBS ARE YOU BROADCASTING? STAYING SAFE IN A TECH-BASED WORLD ☆

Justin Fitzsimmons, Lauren Wagner

*\*Restricted to law enforcement and prosecutors.\**

Nothing is more important than the safety of those who work to investigate and prosecute crime. This workshop will cover website data, IP tracing, cell phone considerations, Bluetooth sniffing, and home wireless networks. The presenters will show attendees how to search social media and find the traces of themselves online.

## WHAT'S IMMIGRATION GOT TO DO WITH IT? PROSECUTING GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE & HUMAN TRAFFICKING CASES INVOLVING IMMIGRANT VICTIMS OF CRIME

However, prosecutors face challenges in court when handling cases with immigrant victims. ## WHEN DOMESTIC VIOLENCE COMES TO FAMILY COURT

Victims accessing the family court system believe the courts will protect them and their children; instead, protective parenting by the victim is labeled as alienation. 



## PARKING IN DALLAS


