CASE STUDIES

A CASE STUDY: THE ROCKY PATH OF A TEENAGER'S ASSAULT, FROM INCIDENT THROUGH TRIAL & BEYOND ☆ +

Liana Hill, Kelvin Minton

This case study of the assault of a 17-year-old girl by her boss at a pizza parlor will take attendees from the time of the initial report through her examination, advocacy, and trial. The presenters will review how each component affected the case, from interviews of witnesses to suspect examination and beyond. Advocacy was a key in how the victim felt she was treated and how each turn affected her life and recovery. The case may not have ended in the outcome everyone wanted, but it was the outcome desired by the victim.

CHASING HUBRIS: A STUDY OF SEXUAL EXPLOITATION & VIOLENCE IN THE 'PICS OR IT DIDN'T HAPPEN' GENERATION Rebecca Sommers

This case study will review the video recorded sexual assault of an intoxicated teenage girl by two teenage acquaintances at a house party, one of whom later solicited the victim to commit perjury for him. A variety of legal issues were encountered, including waiver to adult court, search/seizure, destruction of evidence, ongoing interference by one of the defendants, and ongoing recovery of cell phone evidence. From failure to collect evidence at the crime scene, to advancements in technology, to inability to communicate directly with the minor victim, this case was a teaching moment for all law enforcement, forensic analysts, victim advocates, and prosecutors involved.

ELEVEN MONTHS TO LIVE ☆ Dewey Mitchell, Jessica Trevizo

On April 27, 2016, Grand Prairie police received a 911 call from Jaelon Marcus reporting that his brother, Anthony Marcus, had shot his girlfriend. When police arrived, they found the lifeless body of Florencia Padilla, who had been kidnapped at gunpoint by Anthony one month prior, with two gunshots to the head. This case study will chronicle the escalation of violence and control mechanisms of an abuser over a span of 11 months. Attendees will study the different instances in which the system could have intervened, the role that an obsession with guns played, and what we can do to educate victims of all ages.

ILLUSION OF CHOICE: A CASE STUDY (PT. 1 & 2) ☆

Rebecca Bender, Rebekah Charleston, Mark Parsons, Andrew Stover

Two teenage girls from opposite sides of the United States thought they'd found men who truly cared for them. Instead, the men were carefully luring them into the world of human trafficking, in which they were forced, defrauded, and coerced into prostitution. Years later, a tip was received on a potential drug case—or is it bank fraud, or tax evasion? The investigation uncovered the covert human trafficking ring that spanned across the country. Attendees will learn from all four parties involved on the detailed grooming tactics employed to brainwash the victims and lessons learned on what did and didn't work during the investigation and prosecution.

PIMPOLOGY IN PRACTICE: THE CONTINUOUS TRAFFICKING CASE OF GLEN DUKES ☆

Kirsta Melton, Ryan Wright

For five years, Glen Dukes preyed upon drug-addicted women engaged in prostitution on the east side of San Antonio. Once they had been persuaded to join Team Glen, they were beaten, strangled, drugged, raped, and regularly threatened with death. Glen controlled every aspect of their lives. When that control seemed threatened, Glen murdered several women and forced his team to help clean and dispose of the bodies as yet another way to bind them to him. This case study will discuss how to try trafficking cases where the victims were prostituting before and after the trafficking; highlight the wide range of coercive tactics used by traffickers and unique trial issues when dealing with adult sex trafficking; and discuss the use of the continuous trafficking charge to ultimately bring a killer to justice.

POLYWOOD CRIPS "I BE DOING PIMP SH***": DISMANTLING A GANG SEX TRAFFICKING ORGANIZATION

John Kochan, Cara Pierce

For years, the Polywood Crips used rapes, beatings, and death threats to control numerous adult and child sex trafficking victims in Ft. Worth, TX. Within weeks of learning about this group's activities, federal and local law enforcement sprung to action. In less than a year, nine members had been charged and convicted of sex trafficking-related offenses. This case study will discuss the investigative and prosecutorial challenges in the case, including gaining victim trust, witness intimidation, evidence-gathering, and preparing victims for trial.

PROSECUTING THE MANIPULATIVE, TORTUROUS, & COERCIVE DEFENDANT WITHOUT VICTIM COOPERATION ☆

Betsy Anderson, Shannon Archer

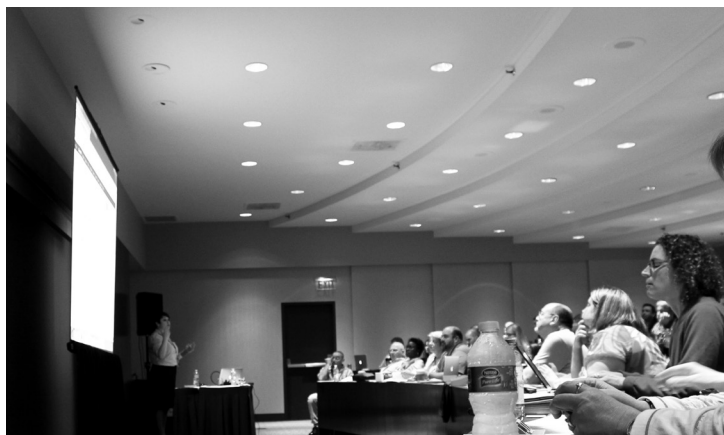
After being arrested on a warrant for assaulting his pregnant girlfriend, Malcolm Lahori returned to his girlfriend's house with a no contact order in his hand. He forced his way into her home, attempted to strangle her in the bathroom, and then waterboarded her in the bathtub. Once in jail, Lahori called his girlfriend several times—threatening, manipulating, and attempting to control her. At trial, his girlfriend did not appear, but Lahori was convicted with only the testimony of police officers. This case study will show how a thorough police investigation can allow the prosecution to hold an offender accountable under the legal theory of Forfeiture by Wrongdoing.

SEXUAL PREDATORS ON WHEELS

Larry Hallmark

During this case study of the abduction and murder of Casey Jo Pipestem, a 19-year-old Seminole Indian from Oklahoma, attendees will be given a glimpse into the world of truck stops, truck drivers, and prostitutes. The presenter will examine six serial killer truck drivers, including John Robert Williams, Casey's killer. Williams is responsible for the murders of more than a dozen women, and that number continues to grow. Investigation strategies, obstacles, and lessons learned will be discussed, as well as resources and contacts at the federal level.

CASE STUDIES



STRANGLER MEMORIES: THE ROBERT ISRAEL CASE +

Darrell Gibson, Kelsey McKay

After being unconscious for an unknown amount of time, Stacey was found beaten and swollen, laying by a horse pen, with only the memory of being punched in the face. Those caring for Stacey followed their instinct that she had been strangled, and with no external injury or testimony from the victim to corroborate this theory, the nurse, investigator, and prosecutor successfully collaborated to investigate and prosecute this case. This case study will inspire agencies to work together in a new way to bring the most evil of perpetrators, those who strangle, to justice.

TESTIFYING IN COURT: UNDERSTANDING THE IMPACT OF NON-TYPICAL COMMUNICATION IN LITIGATION ☆

Beverly Frantz, Jack O'Neill

The criminal justice system faces major and complex challenges to ensure that equal justice is afforded to all those who come into contact with the system as victims and witnesses. One significant challenge is to recognize and support survivors of crime who communicate in a non-typical manner. This case study will follow the sexual assault case of a 16-year-old girl with cerebral palsy and significant speech disability throughout the investigation, the prosecution led by three different ADAs at different times, and an appeal to the Pennsylvania Supreme Court that allowed a speech pathologist to be recognized as a court-appointed translator for a survivor with progressive multiple sclerosis.

THREAT ASSESSMENT OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PREDATORS: THE EDWARD CAMPBELL CASE STUDY

Vicki King

Released on bail after a vicious attack on his wife, Edward Campbell's quest for revenge left three dead, two police officers wounded, and a son serving a life prison sentence. Through the lens of Campbell's murderous crime spree, participants will explore the operational threat assessment protocols and innovative intervention strategies developed at one of the largest academic medical centers in the U.S. The presenter will also discuss ongoing challenges and strategies to prevent, mitigate, and/or neutralize emerging threats to medical campuses.

U.S. V. KENNETH CHATMAN: SEX TRAFFICKING IN THE MIDST OF SOUTH FLORIDA'S OPIOID CRISIS ☆

Peter Angell, Bill Stewart

In early 2015, FBI Miami received information that Kenneth Chatman, an operator of multiple South Florida substance abuse recovery centers, was engaged in the sex trafficking and exploitation of his female clients. As Chatman was already on the FBI's radar as a target of a health care fraud (HCF) investigation, Special Agents in Palm Beach County pooled resources to bring Chatman and his associates to justice in a first-of-its-kind federal case involving both HCF and sex trafficking violations. This case study will focus on Chatman's use of physical violence, fear, isolation, and dependency tactics to manipulate and exploit some of society's most vulnerable individuals.

VANDERBILT RAPE INVESTIGATIONS (PT. 1 & 2)

Chad Gish, Janice Norman

WHEN SERIAL RAPISTS MURDER ☆ +

Frederick Harris, Sheilah Priori

This case study will detail the investigation of a sexual predator that viciously assaulted, robbed, and murdered his victims. One victim was found lying in a pool of her own blood behind a building in Killeen, TX, left for dead. She was transported to the hospital for a forensic exam, which resulted in DNA collection that connected the predator to several rapes, robberies, serious assaults, and murder across two states. The presenters will discuss the medical aspect of the sexual assault exam and how law enforcement was able to build community trust and track a serial predator with the help of a forensic nurse, a brave woman, and a mother who refused to let her daughter's murder go unsolved.

WHEN TWO WORLDS COLLIDE: HOW MILITARY & CIVILIAN LAW ENFORCEMENT COOPERATION CAN LEAD TO SUCCESSFUL PROSECUTIONS (PT. 1 & 2) ☆

Michael Crumrine, Elizabeth Walker

Alcohol and drug-facilitated sexual assaults are undoubtedly some of the most difficult cases to work. However, with the cooperation and collaboration of Special Victims Prosecutors and investigators, these crimes can be thoroughly investigated and successfully prosecuted. In February 2012 in Austin, TX, three soldiers separated a highly-intoxicated University of Texas student from her friend, transported her to a hotel, and raped her. This case study will examine the first successful prosecution of a substantially incapacitated sexual assault case on the world's largest military installation, Ft. Hood, TX and will focus on the collaborative effort between the U.S. Army Judge Advocate General's Corps and civilian law enforcement.

EXIF DATA & USB INFO: TAKING YOUR INVESTIGATION TO THE NEXT LEVEL ★

Bryan Franke

EXIF data can be found embedded within pictures. Learn what EXIF data is, what it contains, how to view it, how that data could enhance your investigation, and methods to document this information for the court, judge, and jury in an easily understood method. Ever wonder if someone has uploaded or downloaded information/programs/spyware via flash drive? Have they connected a key logger to one of your USB ports? When you are executing a search warrant, would you like to know if the suspect has other storage devices or digital cameras you have not found or connected their phone to the computer to download pictures? The presenter will provide a software tool and hands-on application so you can quickly answer these questions while on scene.

FACEBOOK ADVANCED SEARCHING & URL MANIPULATIONS ★

Justin Fitzsimmons, Lauren Wagner

Facebook is the largest worldwide social media website and contains a substantial amount of potential investigative information. First, attendees will use Facebook graph search to find a target profile. Once a target profile has been identified, the presenters will use Facebook URL manipulations to show content beyond what can be seen from the profile.

FIELD SEARCH LAB (PT. 1 & 2)

This lab will provide hands-on training with Field Search, a widely used non-technical tool for conducting triage, consent searches, and compliance monitoring of computers in the field. Each attendee will receive a free, fully functional copy of Field Search v5, the latest significant upgrade to Field Search.

MUST-HAVE TECHNOLOGY TOOLS

Justin Fitzsimmons, Lauren Wagner

This lab will introduce must-have software and methodologies. Topics will include Firefox add-ons to save videos from YouTube and other websites, Google searching techniques to make searching for information much more efficient and reliable, Google advanced operators, and other Google services. Other software that will be introduced includes: Jing (screenshot and screencast software), VLC (for playing movies), Irfanview (for viewing images), and Audacity (for audio editing).

TRACING EMAIL COMMUNICATION

Bryan Franke

In this lab, attendees will learn how to locate, view, and read email header data. They will learn about available resources to determine what Internet Service Provider (ISP)

was used to send the email; locate where and how to serve preservation requests and legal process to said ISP; and what some email services do to change the email header data and how that impacts an investigation. Attendees will also learn how to geo-locate a general area for the possible suspect before getting the physical address from the ISP. These skill sets will then be applied to a variety of emails while in the lab. Various methods of documenting these activities for future court proceedings will also be addressed.

TWITTER INVESTIGATIONS

Justin Fitzsimmons, Lauren Wagner

Twitter searching will be introduced to allow searching for Twitter profiles, tweet keywords and hashtags, and even searching for tweets from a particular latitude and longitude. These Twitter searching techniques will include both standard and hidden Boolean operators, ensuring that investigators have access to the best possible evidence.

ABDUCTIONS & EXPLOITATION ON COLLEGE CAMPUSES

Native women are at the highest risk of physical and sexual assault and are over-represented as victims of human trafficking in communities across the U.S. and Canada. Additionally, many Native women go missing in the U.S. and Canada, and their cases go uninvestigated or even unreported to law enforcement. This workshop will look at the growing problem of women and girls from tribal communities who are victims of exploitation and suggest strategies for protection and recovery.

ANIMALS & DOMESTIC VIOLENCE: ANOTHER TOOL OF MANIPULATION +

Maya Gupta, Kelsey McKay

Animal cruelty and threats to harm pets are tactics commonly used by batterers to coerce and intimidate human family members. This workshop will explore the dynamics of animal cruelty in the context of power and control and will explain how this awareness can improve victim safety and batterer accountability.

ASSESSING CULPABILITY IN HUMAN TRAFFICKING CASES ☆

Jane Anderson, Brooke Grona-Robb

This workshop will discuss crimes that commonly accompany trafficking activity and outline the strategic advantages of investigating and charging those offenses. The presenters will suggest strategies for analyzing the culpability of trafficking victims who have themselves engaged in criminal activity and discuss appropriate considerations for deciding whether and how to charge and sentence such victim-offenders.

ATTACHMENT & TRAUMA: HEALING THE MOTHER-CHILD ATTACHMENT AFTER DOMESTIC VIOLENCE +

Ruth Guerreiro

The mother-child relationship is vital to a child's healing after domestic violence. This workshop will discuss attachment theory and how to implement specific attachment activities when working with a mother and child who have experienced domestic violence. Guiding principles and techniques will be taken from various therapeutic models, and attendees will learn how to involve a mother in her child's trauma processing.

BACK BY POPULAR DEMAND: HOW TO TALK ABOUT SEXUAL ASSAULT WITHOUT BUMMING OUT YOUR AUDIENCE

Kimberly Dickman

Sexual violence is a topic that needs serious focus and respect, but talking about it can be a bummer. How do we balance the reverence needed with this issue while working to engage an audience to not only stay awake, but be fired up to engage in making change?

BATTERED WOMEN IN CHILD CUSTODY & VISITATION DISPUTES ☆

Lundy Bancroft

This workshop explains how and why family law courts are so badly abandoning abused women and their children across the U.S. and Canada. Topics examined will include the role of the attorney, common errors made by custody and psychological evaluators, destructive myths, and discriminatory attitudes that influence judicial behavior, and public misconceptions about custody. The presenters will also discuss how to right these wrongs through strategies for empowering battered women, training attorneys and court personnel, and building a powerful grassroots movement for family court reform.

BEST PRACTICES FOR POLICE & PROSECUTION: RESPONSES TO MEN WHO BATTER ☆

Lundy Bancroft

Improving police and prosecutorial response to men who batter is the single best approach to reducing domestic violence perpetration. This workshop will cover best practices for on-scene response, follow-up investigation, and prosecution through conviction, emphasizing the need for coordination among the different players. Topics will include identifying the primary aggressor, interacting with children at the scene, evidence gathering, process-centered prosecution, prosecuting without the victim, and effective sentencing for perpetrators.

BEST PRACTICES FOR PREVENTING RELATIONSHIP ABUSE +

Jeff Temple

Adolescent relationship abuse (ARA) is associated with a host of negative mental and physical health consequences. Moreover, individuals who perpetrate violence and sexual aggression in their adolescent relationships are at heightened risk for continuing this behavior in their adult intimate relationships. In this workshop, attendees will learn best practices for the prevention of ARA.

THE BODY NEVER LIES: SOCIAL NEUROSCIENCE & THE EFFECTS OF TRAUMA +

Mischa Peck

During this workshop, attendees will be introduced to the neuroscience of trauma and the social neuroscientific consequences of trauma. The presenter will examine interactions with a traumatized person and tactics for building rapport and relationship. Attendees will be given an overview of treatment options with an emphasis on the effectiveness of EMDR therapy.

BUILDING A COORDINATED COMMUNITY RESPONSE +

Mark Wynn

What are the key elements to successfully beginning a CCR and keeping it going? What are the first steps? This workshop will examine the building blocks of successful partnerships, working collaboratively to identify and solve problems, sharing a common goal, understanding each other's responsibilities and limitations, and maintaining honest and trusting communications.

BUILDING & SUSTAINING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE HIGH RISK TEAMS +

David Scott

This workshop will focus on creating and sustaining a DVHRT. The presenter will discuss the roles and expectations of the DVHRT Coordinator, establishing core team members and drafting memos of understanding, and the assessment for establishing criteria for a case.

BUILDING STRONGER ORGANIZATIONS: BECOMING VICARIOUS TRAUMA INFORMED (PT. 1 & 2) +

Karen Kalergis, Chris Scallon

Law enforcement, victim advocates, and other first responders are routinely exposed to trauma and are impacted by the cumulative stress of the daily requirements of the job. It is critical for agencies and organizations to recognize members' well-being and address vicarious trauma (VT). This workshop will define VT, discuss its potential impact, and highlight indicators for individuals and organizations. The presenters will then discuss the Vicarious Trauma Toolkit and other resources, strategies, and programs to support members' well-being and create stronger, more sustainable organizations.

THE CHANGE PROCESS FOR ABUSIVE MEN ☆

Lundy Bancroft

This workshop will discuss how to assess whether an abuser has made meaningful progress in overcoming his abuse issues and how to detect false claims of change. The presenter will examine specific roles that professionals and community members can play in contributing to change and accountability for abusers.

CIVIL MEETS CRIMINAL: COORDINATING OUR RESPONSE ☆**Teresa Garvey, Meg Garvin**

A coordinated response to intimate partner violence provides maximum support to victims. By understanding each other's roles and sharing information with the victim-client's consent, prosecutors and civil practitioners can advance their common interest in the victim's safety and well-being during the course of criminal proceedings and any related civil proceedings.

COLD KITS: FORENSIC EVIDENCE & COLD-CASE SEXUAL ASSAULT**Jane Anderson, John Wilkinson**

Cold-case prosecutions of sexual assault may be complicated by jurors' unrealistic expectations about forensic evidence. This workshop will focus on understanding, securing, introducing, and explaining forensic evidence that may be available in these cases: identification of evidence, case preparation, working with experts, presentation of expert testimony, and overcoming defense challenges.

COMBATING CULTURE IN THE MILITARY ☆**Paul Armstrong, Jamie Carbajal**

This workshop will address mainstream U.S. military culture in terms of sexuality, gender roles, and hook-ups and discuss how military organizations can use Sexual Assault Prevention & Response and Equal Opportunity programs to combat and redefine norms based on strong standards, ethos, and the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

THE COMMON THREAD: STALKING & CRIMES AGAINST WOMEN +**Jennifer Landhuis**

Despite high prevalence rates, stalking continues to be underreported by victims and overlooked by responders. Stalking victims often report feeling ignored by the very system that is designed to assist them. This workshop will assist practitioners in developing strategies to increase victim safety and offender accountability while identifying stalking as the commonality in violence against women cases.

THE CONNECTION BETWEEN DOMESTIC VIOLENCE & MASS SHOOTINGS**David Keck**

Although mass shootings only account for a fraction of the total gun deaths each year, statistics show that over half of those were related to domestic or family violence. In nearly half of these, the shooter demonstrated warning signs prior to the incident, and in one third of the incidents, the shooter was prohibited from possessing guns. Can mass shootings be prevented? This workshop will explore this question and discuss strategies to reduce gun violence.

CONTINUUM OF CARE MODEL FOR SURVIVORS OF DOMESTIC SEX TRAFFICKING +**Jeanne Allert**

The Samaritan Women has been providing transitional, restorative, and graduate care for survivors of domestic sex trafficking for 10 years. This workshop will be an advanced examination of the wounding incurred by victims of trafficking and the trauma that must be addressed, as well as how this human services model responds to the complex needs of survivors.

COULD YOU RECOGNIZE A STAGED DEATH SCENE IF YOU STEPPED IN IT? +**Bill Smock**

First responders, specifically police officers, death investigators, fire fighters, and EMS professionals, have a unique opportunity to recognize or miss the clues of a staged crime scene. This workshop will examine and analyze three actual death/crime scenes and test attendees' abilities to differentiate fact from fiction. Will justice be served, or will someone get away with murder?

CRIMINAL PROFILING OF SERIAL KILLERS, SEX OFFENDERS, & OTHER VIOLENT CRIMINALS**John Douglas**

This workshop is a continuation of the keynote presentation. The presenter will discuss the methods used in the identification and apprehension of individuals engaged in serial violent crimes. Attendees will learn to examine behavioral analysis as a viable investigative tool that can contribute positively in investigations from the crime scene to the courtroom. There will be significant time allowed for Q & A.

CULTURE COUNTS: THE INTERSECTION OF PIMP CULTURE, PORNOGRAPHY, PROSTITUTION, & HUMAN TRAFFICKING ☆**Kirsta Melton**

At the intersection of pimp culture, pornography, prostitution, and human trafficking, one finds the key to the proliferation of sex trafficking. This workshop will bring those connections out of the shadows. The presenter will discuss how recognition of the connections could alter potential strategies in the fight against human trafficking in prevention, recovery, prosecution, and rehabilitation contexts.

DETERMINING DOMINANT AGGRESSOR & SELF DEFENSE +**Ray Goins, Ronnie Johnson**

The workshop will move the investigative focus from the immediate incident to the totality of the relationship. The presenters will discuss tools to determine dominate aggressor, legal use of force in defense of self or others, wound dynamics, and methods of determining offensive versus defensive wounds. Attendees will determine the dominate aggressor in a multi-part video scenario.

DEVELOPING A COLLABORATIVE RESPONSE TO VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN IN INDIAN COUNTRY: FEDERAL PROSECUTION OPTIONS**Leslie Hagen**

Victimization rates in Indian country are high, particularly for sexual assault and domestic violence crimes. Typically, a state or federal prosecutor has concurrent jurisdiction with the tribe, but it is likely that tribal personnel will be the first responders. This workshop will address multi-jurisdictions working collaboratively to investigate and prosecute violent crimes in tribal communities.

DEVELOPING A FAMILY JUSTICE CENTER: THE GOOD, THE BAD, THE UGLY, & WHY IT'S TOTALLY WORTH IT +**Michelle Morgan, Ken Shetter**

This workshop will explore the benefits of serving victims of domestic violence and children who witness violence through multi-agency, multi-disciplinary collaboratives. In addition to discussing the development of family justice centers around the world, the presenters will discuss their experience in building the One Safe Place Family Justice Center, located in Fort Worth, TX.

DISRUPTING COMMERCIAL FRONT SEX & LABOR TRAFFICKING ☆**Rochelle Keyhan, Francheska Loza**

Polaris' "Disruption Strategies" works to disrupt embedded systems that empower and enable 25 different types of human trafficking in the U.S. Attendees will learn about disrupting commercial front sex trafficking and assisting law enforcement, service providers, and other government agencies in addressing sex and labor trafficking in illicit massage businesses, cantinas, and go-go bars.

ELDER ABUSE: STRATEGIES & TIPS FOR EFFECTIVELY WORKING WITH OLDER SURVIVORS +**Juanita Davis**

10,000 Americans turn 65 each day. Approximately 1 in 10 older adults report being abused in the past year, the majority of whom are women. This workshop will discuss practical strategies and tips for working effectively with older victims, issues of equity and justice, and the importance of collaboration.

EMPATHY-BASED INTERROGATION WITH DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SUSPECTS**Michael Milnor**

Interrogation is focused on soliciting confessions and misses the opportunity to gather valuable information. In this workshop, attendees will learn a new mindset of interrogation, based on an empathetic, rapport-building approach. The goal of the interrogation process is to gather additional leads and information in a conversational, non-adversarial manner which will keep suspects talking.

EMPLOYMENT RIGHTS OF VICTIMS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, SEXUAL ASSAULT, & STALKING**Hannah Alexander, Robin Runge**

Victims of domestic and sexual violence should not be forced to choose between their job and their safety. Attendees will be better able to describe the impact of violence against women on their ability to obtain and maintain employment, identify the laws and policies that provide protections for victims, and apply strategies for advocating for victims.

ENGAGING MEN TO END VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN (LUNCH SESSION)**Jan Langbein, Jim Savage, Crayton Webb**

This workshop will explore unique ways in which men can be an active and critical part of ending violence against women. Genesis HeROs (He Respects Others) serve as mentors, grill masters, court advocates, funders, ambassadors, and community educators. The panel will discuss how to organize, recruit, train, and engage an all men's auxiliary as a resource for your program.

WORKSHOP DESCRIPTIONS

EPIC INTERVENTIONS: MANAGING THE RISK

Jen Annis, Faye Luppi

This workshop will first introduce the ODARA risk assessment tool for domestic violence offenders. Using a case study, presenters will then discuss the creative multi-disciplinary risk management interventions implemented in Maine: The Enhanced Police Intervention Collaborative (EPIC) project, High Risk Response Teams, and Electronic Monitoring.

ETHICAL CONSIDERATIONS IN PROSECUTING HUMAN TRAFFICKING CASES ☆

Melissa Holman, Mallory Vincent

Trafficking cases provide varied and complicated issues for the discovery process. Through the lens of legal ethics, this workshop will discuss issues and solutions surrounding uncooperative victims, case charging issues, case preparation, and trial. This workshop will provide tools to successfully work with and protect the rights of victims, navigate the discovery process, and ensure that prosecutors meet their Brady and Morton obligations under the law.

ETHICS & ETIQUETTE IN MODERN POLICING

William Margolis

This workshop will provide an overview of ethics and etiquette in law enforcement. How is law enforcement biased? Is it a learned behavior? What are some ethical dilemmas law enforcement faces every day? What is etiquette in law enforcement? Take an inside look through the eyes of a police officer.

ETHICS IN FAMILY VIOLENCE CASES ☆

Dana Nelson

When may a victim in a family violence case need their own attorney? What about those recantations? Ethics for prosecutors and attorneys representing victims take on new dimensions in family violence cases. Attendees will discuss the issues raised through scenarios encountered regularly and review the statutes and case law that guide conduct.

EVERYONE DESERVES TO BE HEARD: LAW ENFORCEMENT & THE LGBTQ+ COMMUNITY WORKING TOGETHER TO BREAK DOWN BARRIERS

Michael Crumrine

This workshop will address unique barriers to reporting present in the LGBTQ+ community and steps that can be taken to overcome those barriers. The presenter will also examine the significant impact law enforcement's response to LGBTQ+ victims has on the community and the importance of building positive relationships that encourage trust and respect.

FACEBOOK: WORKING WITH LAW ENFORCEMENT TO KEEP COMMUNITIES SAFE

Emily Vacher

THIS WORKSHOP IS RESTRICTED TO LAW ENFORCEMENT. This workshop will discuss Facebook basics, the latest safety and privacy controls available to prevent and reduce risks for users of the site, safety initiatives designed to combat crimes, and a detailed review of Facebook's on-line records request system for law enforcement use.

FACILITATING EXPERIENTIAL TRAUMA INFORMATION: CHANGING THE CONVERSATION IN TRIBAL COMMUNITIES

Leslie Hagen, Russell Strand

Most people are trained to ask victims for a detailed linear narrative after experiencing a traumatic event. Unfortunately, this approach may inhibit recall of important evidence. This may be even more true in tribal communities where the majority may be victims of crime and where generations have experienced trauma. The Forensic Experiential Trauma Interview (FETI) interview technique is a three-pronged approach that unlocks the trauma experience.

FALSE REPORTING OF SEXUAL ASSAULT CASES: MOVING BEYOND THE ISSUES ☆ +

Carl Hershman

Not recognizing a true false report of sexual assault may be one of the most important barriers to successfully investigating sexual assault. Non-stranger cases have several red flags that are actually realistic dynamics of sexual assault. The presenter will review the difference between a false report vs. a baseless report, as well as how law enforcement can unintentionally create a false report themselves. Attendees will learn how to effectively handle actual false reports.

FARADAY METHODS LAB

John Bair

The presenter will take attendees through the various ways in which to prevent against live mobile evidence contamination. This presentation and interactive lab will allow attendees to employ various Faraday methods using their own network active phones, address steps for the non-forensic first responder, and assist with testimony during the judicial process.

FATALITY REVIEW & THE CONTRIBUTIONS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE ADVOCATES

Stephanie Mayer

This workshop will offer perspectives on the contributions of advocates to fatality review teams. The presenter will explore advocates' roles on teams, confidentiality concerns, and relationships with surviving family members. Examples of recommendations for improvements in victim services agencies from teams across the country will also be offered.

FATALITY REVIEW: THE STATE OF THE ART +

Neil Websdale

This workshop will feature an overview of the philosophy, process, and principles of domestic violence fatality review. The work of the Montana Statewide Team and its Native American Team will be highlighted. Attendees will gain the tools necessary to begin the process of assembling a team in their community or expanding and reinvigorating the work of an existing team.

FIRST LINE SUPERVISORS' RESPONSE TO VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

Mark Wynn

This workshop will highlight effective ways that supervisors can engage first responders in addressing violence against women. Attendees will be exposed to methods of empowering and strengthening officers, innovative employee incentives and rewards, and other motivating techniques, as well as skills to mentor others on these crimes.

FORCED & CHILD MARRIAGE IN THE U.S.: IDENTIFYING & CLOSING GAPS THAT PUT GIRLS & WOMEN AT RISK (PT. 1 & 2)

Jeanne Smoot, Casey Swegman

Part 1 of this workshop will provide an overview of the complex dynamics surrounding forced marriage. Attendees will learn to screen individuals at risk of forced marriage and respond to survivors' needs from a "consent comes first" framework. Available legal remedies and support resources will be reviewed. Part 2 will review the distinctions and overlaps between forced, arranged, and child marriage. Discussion will include how state laws often provide loopholes that allow abuse and pose obstacles for help-seeking. Attendees will learn about recent research on the consequences of early marriage, a growing U.S. movement to reform minimum marriage age laws, and other recent reforms.

FORENSIC EVALUATION OF FATAL & NON-FATAL STRANGULATION VICTIMS (PT. 1 & 2) ☆ +

Bill Smock

The medical and forensic needs of non-fatal strangulation victims are often overlooked when there are no visible injuries, and recent medical evidence has demonstrated that a strangulation victim may have sustained a life-threatening injury but appear normal. This workshop will provide the foundation for police officers, prosecutors, and medical professionals to investigate and understand the pathophysiology and medical consequences of strangulation.

FORENSIC EVALUATION OF GUNSHOT WOUNDS: APPLICATIONS FOR DOMESTIC & OFFICER-INVOLVED SHOOTINGS (PT. 1 & 2) ☆ +

Bill Smock

Physical characteristics, rather than size of the wound, will determine if a gunshot wound is an entrance or exit, the range of fire, and if the injuries are consistent with the history given by the victim. This workshop will assist attendees in evaluation, diagnosis, investigation, and prosecution of gunshot wounds.

FORENSIC EXPERIENTIAL TRAUMA INTERVIEW: A TRAUMA-INFORMED EXPERIENCE (PT. 1 & 2) ☆ +

Russell Strand

The Forensic Experiential Trauma Interview is a promising best-practice in the investigation and prosecution of many forms of violence, including sexual assault and trauma cases. This workshop will discuss this important interview technique, which draws on the best practices of child forensic interviews, critical incident stress management, and neuroscience.

FROM AWARENESS TO ACTIVISM: GENDER BASED VIOLENCE PREVENTION PROGRAM IMPLEMENTATION

Jen Brockman

In 2016, the University of Kansas established and funded the Sexual Assault Prevention and Education Center (SAPEC) to bring consistency and best practice to campus with gender based violence prevention efforts. This workshop will highlight the strategies and lessons learned in the implementation of the comprehensive Gender Based Violence Prevention program utilizing the socioecological model and social justice frame work at a flagship institution.

GARDEN OF TRUTH: PROSTITUTION & TRAFFICKING OF NATIVE WOMEN**Guadalupe Lopez, Nicole Matthews**

This workshop will share findings and information from research with 105 Native women in Minnesota on their experiences of being used in prostitution and trafficking. It will include information on risk factors, health implications, needs of survivors, and recommendations.

GATHERING & ADMITTING DIGITAL EVIDENCE**Ian Harris**

Communication software, social media, and location services are increasingly used to stalk, harass, and terrorize. This interactive workshop will examine the technologies most commonly misused in domestic violence cases and outline the process for gathering and admitting evidence of tech abuse. Attendees will learn about ethical issues related to online evidence collection, how to provide clients with the tools to assist in gathering evidence, and how to admit tech evidence in court.

GENDER EXPANSIVE EXPERTISE**Mischa Peck**

Gender diversity has always existed; biology thrives on variation. Yet society struggles with gender variety, and transgender (trans) persons experience disproportionately high rates of discrimination and violence. In this workshop, attendees will increase their gender expansive expertise with new knowledge and skills to better understand trans and gender nonconforming populations, as well as explore biases and misconceptions to more effectively work with diverse gender minority populations.

GENESIS TRAUMA APPROACH**Ruth Guerreiro, Jordyn Lawson**

This workshop will discuss the Genesis Trauma Approach, which integrates the Trans-theoretical Model of Change, the Genesis Foundational Cognitive Approach, and the use of the Adaptive Information Processing model, including the use of Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR).

GETTING GRANTS**Jim Tanner**

Responding to Requests for Proposals is part of most agencies' tasks. Based on 46 years of successfully competing for grant funding (with a 99% success rate), the presenter will share simple steps he uses to ensure his proposals are well received. Developing unique responses within a systematic approach greatly enhances the chance of being awarded grant funding.

HOW FAITH COMMUNITIES CAN RESPOND TO DOMESTIC VIOLENCE**Charles Dahm**

Faith communities are in a unique position to reach victims and perpetrators of domestic violence. Many victims want their faith community to strengthen and counsel them, but many clergy are blind to the problem or how to respond. Creative, positive responses are possible with little effort. Attendees will learn how some communities are responding.

HOW FORENSIC DNA TESTING OF SEXUAL ASSAULT KITS CAN IDENTIFY SUSPECTED SERIAL SEXUAL OFFENDERS**Rebecca Campbell**

Testing sexual assault kits and uploading eligible DNA profiles into CODIS (Combined DNA Index System), the federal criminal DNA database, may help identify suspected serial sexual offenders. This workshop will review how CODIS hits and criminal history records can be used to identify suspected serial perpetrators. Research findings and case studies from Detroit's untested rape kits will be presented.

HOW TO OVERCOME AUDIENCE RESISTANCE & BEAT THE BLAME GAME (PT. 1 & 2)**Heather Imrie**

This workshop will give anti-violence professionals an overview of best practices for creating compelling programs and changing negative attitudes. It will be followed by a facilitated lecture on the most common reasons why our culture can blame victims and how to dismantle those arguments through an application of myth-busting logic. Attendees will receive the tools they need to create powerful prevention programming.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING SURVIVOR PANEL**Rebekah Charleston, Allison Franklin, Katina Stith**

To properly understand the dynamics of trafficking and the impact on the community, it is important to hear from victims and survivors. This facilitated workshop will address the most frequently asked questions of survivors and allow for audience interaction with a panel of trafficking survivors who will provide insight into their victimization, how traffickers control their victims, and successful strategies for intervention and recovery.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING TASK FORCES: CREATING & SUSTAINING A RESPONSE TO MODERN SLAVERY**John Vanek**

This workshop will examine how successful human trafficking task forces are formed, sustained, and funded. Task force membership, decision-making, and structure will be addressed. This workshop is appropriate for anyone already involved in the response to trafficking or looking to form or enhance a task force or coalition.

I AM EVIDENCE SCREENING & PANEL DISCUSSION**Justin Boardman, Kortney Hughes, Sheilah Priori, Sarah Haacke Byrd, John Wilkinson**

Join the Joyful Heart Foundation for a screening of Mariska Hargitay's new HBO documentary, *I AM EVIDENCE*, which highlights the backlog of hundreds of thousands of untested rape kits across the United States. Stay after the screening to participate in a discussion and Q&A session with a panel of experts about the state of the untested rape kit backlog in our country and what can be done to end it.

IMMIGRATION LAW 101 (LUNCH SESSION)**Patricia Freshwater**

This workshop will offer an overview of immigration law with a focus on options available to victims of violence. Topics covered will be family-based immigration, U and T visas, VAWA, asylum, and special immigrant juvenile visas. Attendees should come with questions, as plenty of time will be dedicated to Q&A.

IMPLEMENTATION OF A STRANGULATION SUPPLEMENT: PROVIDING GUIDANCE & CREDIBILITY FOR FIRST RESPONDERS**Kelsey McKay**

Felony statutes have been passed in the majority of states regarding strangulation assaults. However, the criminal justice system has failed to implement necessary protocols or training to provide police officers guidance to investigate and collect the unique evidence necessary to hold offenders accountable. As a result, many cases are rejected for prosecution and law enforcement is left without guidance. Attendees will learn to overcome common challenges strangulation presents including lack of external injury, lack of victim, and misunderstood evidence. This workshop will walk through the implementation of the Strangulation Supplement and provide tips on how to conduct a quality strangulation investigation.

INCREASING VICTIM & OFFICER SAFETY: ASSESSING THREATS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PERPETRATORS**Douglas Burig, Mark Wynn**

Based on principles presented in the USDOJ guidance *Identifying & Preventing Gender Bias in Law Enforcement Response to Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence*, this workshop will discuss agency efforts that can increase officer safety when responding to calls for service. It is imperative that responding officers better understand perpetrators of domestic violence and the control tactics used on victims and law enforcement. The presenters will highlight agency policies and procedures that ensure domestic violence complaints are properly documented, cases are fully investigated, and offenders are held accountable.

IN HER SHOES: LIVING WITH DOMESTIC VIOLENCE**Genesis Women's Shelter & Support**

In Her Shoes is a simulation experience, designed for attendees to experience, firsthand, the hurdles and roadblocks a survivor experiences and help build empathy and understanding for the realities that survivors face in trying to live a life free from abuse. This workshop will be limited to 40 attendees in order to provide a hands-on, interactive experience. Three unique versions will be presented: Living with Domestic Violence, Economic Justice, and Living with Teen Dating Violence.

WORKSHOP DESCRIPTIONS

IN THEIR OWN WORDS: PRACTICAL TOOLS & TECHNIQUES FOR OBTAINING POST-ARREST COMMUNICATIONS IN INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE & TRAFFICKING CASES ☆

Catherine Garcia, Carl Hershman

Using real world examples, this workshop will explain various types of post-arrest communications that can be obtained during an investigation and how they can be used in court. Technical tools and tips will be provided for obtaining and preserving communications, using the content to corroborate or impeach statements and testimony, and programs that can help locate additional witnesses.

INTERACTIVE COURTROOM TESTIMONY (3 HR) ☆

Ray Goins, Ronnie Johnson

This workshop will discuss courtroom etiquette, exceptions to the hearsay rules, and forfeiture by wrongdoing in domestic violence cases. Attendees will testify in mock trial under direct and cross examination. Presenter-led assessments and additional techniques will be discussed after each "testimony".

INTERACTIVE DOMESTIC VIOLENCE CRIME SCENE (3 HR)

Ray Goins, Ronnie Johnson

Attendees will watch a scenario of a domestic violence incident and be put in the shoes of the responding officers on the scene. Attendees will also interact with and interview the parties related to the incident. In addition, the presenters will complete a crime scene investigation of the incident. This workshop will be limited to 50 attendees in order to provide a hands-on, interactive experience.

INTERROGATION OF SEX OFFENDERS: GAINING THE SLIGHT EDGE

In order to gain a "slight edge", this workshop will examine the interrogation landscape of the U.S., including deficiencies in current training, what the research of the High Value Detainee Interrogation group should mean to you, how researched sales and marketing techniques can aid investigations, and how to adopt an evidence-based process of interview and interrogation.

THE INTERSECTION OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE DOCKETS & PROCEDURAL JUSTICE ☆

A lack of procedural justice in domestic violence cases can have deadly consequences for victims and their families. This interactive workshop will discuss how collaboration among key players at the intersection of procedural justice and domestic violence is crucial to setting up a dedicated domestic violence docket.

INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE IN A DIGITAL AGE ☆

This workshop will illustrate the safety risks of various technologies. Presenters will discuss ways technology is misused to stalk, abuse, or harass survivors; how service providers can help victims assess the abuse that is happening; and offer suggestions on how to document or investigate technology-facilitated abuse.

INTRO TO BASIC TACTICAL MEDICINE

In this workshop, attendees will be introduced to situations they may encounter in their work and personal life as well as "what if" scenarios in active threat scenarios. The presenters will talk about certain successes in recent mass casualty events such as controlling external bleeding with improvised or manufactured tourniquets.

INTRODUCTION TO DEEP WEB & DARK NET (LUNCH SESSION)

INVESTIGATING & PROSECUTING SEXUAL ASSAULT INVOLVING VICTIMS WITH DISABILITIES ☆

Persons with disabilities are often particularly vulnerable to sexual victimization. This workshop will prepare law enforcement officers, investigators, and prosecutors to anticipate issues regarding victim support and communication, investigation, and prosecution; develop strategies that take into account the victim's disability; focus on offender exploitation of victim vulnerability; and consider appropriate sentencing options.

INVESTIGATING SEXUAL ASSAULT BY INTOXICATION CASES

High hurdles such as the "consent defense", victims with memory loss, "he said, she said", and delayed reporting make intoxicated sexual cases some of the most difficult to investigate and prosecute, even more so than homicide. Understanding the victim and how these crimes occur is half the battle; getting the case into the courtroom is the other half. Attendees will learn the dynamics of intoxicated sexual assault cases and strategies for successfully moving them through the criminal justice system.

INVESTIGATING WITH AN EVIDENCE-BASED PROSECUTION IN MIND ☆ +

This workshop will cover specific methods of evidence gathering and corroboration, as well as trial preparation and presentation, assuming the victim will not be a witness for the State. Evidence gathering even after the arrest and forfeiture by wrongdoing will also be discussed.

INVESTIGATION OF COLD CASE SEXUAL ASSAULTS ☆

This workshop will discuss strategies for providing justice and closure to victims in past sexual assault cases. When examining the

case facts through fresh eyes, technology, and science, attendees will discover new energy in their investigative practice and insight into new and old cases. The presenters will take attendees through the reengagement of a victim years after their sexual assault case was closed and show where new perspectives and evidence could be found.

IS YOUR FRIDGE SPYING ON YOU? THE INTERNET OF THINGS & OTHER EMERGING TECH

Manufacturers are connecting everything to the Internet: fridges, cars, TVs, security cameras, even sex toys! Attendees will learn why and how almost everything is being woven into the Internet of Things and how that affects survivor safety and privacy. The presenter will also look at other emerging technology and the implications for this type of work to increase survivor safety.

"IT WASN'T RAPE BECAUSE SHE CAME": THE MYTH OF AROUSAL IN SEXUALIZED VIOLENCE (PT. 1 & 2) ☆ +

Arousal during rape is possibly the most devastating aspect for the survivor. Misinterpretation by the judicial system creates barriers to investigation, prosecution, and conviction. This workshop will dispel existing myths, discuss neuro-biology underlying fear and arousal, and provide investigators with tools to turn the trauma of arousal into evidence-supporting prosecution.

LAW ENFORCEMENT NETWORKING LUNCH

LESSONS FROM BAYLOR (LUNCH SESSION)

The former Title IX Coordinator for Baylor University, will discuss her experiences with the school's sexual assault scandal. Although she improved Baylor's Title IX policies and procedures, she ultimately filed an official complaint with the Office for Civil Rights and resigned her position. This session will focus on her experiences with the hope of helping other institutions with their responses to gender and relationship violence.

LIABILITY IN DOMESTIC & SEXUAL VIOLENCE INCIDENTS

This workshop will guide attendees through the legal authority and methods for managing liability using existing case law of "failure to protect" suits. At the conclusion of this workshop, attendees will have a detailed understanding of the dangerousness, complexity, and liability risk of domestic and sexual violence.

MAKING IT STICK: PROTECTING THE RECORD FOR APPEAL

This workshop will discuss the proper creation and protection of the record during all phases of a criminal case to minimize occasions of reversible error.

MOCK REVIEW: DOMESTIC VIOLENCE FATALITY REVIEW (3 HR)

This workshop will allow attendees an opportunity to complete a fatality review experience. Attendees will serve as members of multidisciplinary teams as they review an actual case: building a timeline, identifying red flags, highlighting agency involvement, and coming up with recommendations.

THE MODERN BATTERER +

The tactics and justifications used by men who batter change with time and are influenced by cultural trends. The modern batterer is likely to use high-tech means of surveillance and control, use the custody system as a tactic of continued cruelty, present himself as a "gentle" man, misuse social systems against his partner, and exert his influence to skew public policy and research. This workshop will explore trends in these areas and provides suggestions for constructive response.

THE MOST DANGEROUS POWER OF THE PROSECUTOR +

The enormous exercise of power involved in a prosecutor's charging decision was described by Justice Robert H. Jackson as "the most dangerous power of the prosecutor". How is this power wielded in sexual assault cases? This workshop will explore the power of the prosecutor, limits on prosecutorial discretion, and emerging standards in sexual violence cases.

NAVIGATING INTERSECTION WORLDS: TITLE IX & THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM

This workshop will explore the intersection of survivors' rights as crime victims and students, as well as how university professionals and advocates can best help a survivor navigate these two different worlds. The presenters will provide examples of how these worlds intersect and sometimes come into conflict and share tools, information, and resources to support student-survivors on and off campus, including how to create professional partnerships with community organizations.

THE NEUROBIOLOGY OF TRAUMA: UNDERSTANDING & IMPROVING YOUR RESPONSE TO VIOLENCE

This workshop will provide a brief overview of cutting edge brain science research, which is informing our understanding and improving our responses to victims of domestic and sexual violence. What can seem like counter-intuitive responses by victims and survivors are better understood when you learn that "the brain is doing what the brain does" when trauma is experienced.

OFFICER INVOLVED DOMESTIC & SEXUAL VIOLENCE

Exploring the historical view of domestic and sexual violence within the police family will enable attendees to gain insight into the lack of accurate statistics, the unique

characteristics of conducting investigations, nationally established standards for recruiting, training, and corrective discipline, and the continued need for implementation of policy.

OVW FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES (LUNCH SESSION)

THE POWER OF PROTECTIVE ORDERS: ENHANCING THE LAW & EXPANDING THE USE (LUNCH SESSION) +

Protective Orders are becoming increasingly effective tools to identify and track perpetrators, sometimes even before a criminal case has been filed. PROSECUTING HUMAN TRAFFICKING CASES +

PROTECTING YOUR UNDOCUMENTED CLIENT: RECENT CHANGES IN IMMIGRATION ENFORCEMENT & LEGAL STRATEGIES FOR HELPING VICTIMS +

PROVIDING CONTEXT: USING EXPERTS IN HUMAN TRAFFICKING CASES +

Experts provide human trafficking prosecutors with assistance throughout the course of investigation and trial preparation, as well as testifying at trial to explain trafficking dynamics and victim response to trauma. This workshop will address pretrial consultation with experts, deciding whether to introduce expert testimony at trial, and the legal considerations governing expert testimony.

RAPE CULTURE IN AMERICA: REAL OR IMAGINED? +

This workshop will provide a definition for rape culture and offer a balanced look at the arguments currently being made for the usefulness of this concept when trying to understand the epidemic of sexual violence in the U.S.

RESPONDING TO DOMESTIC VIOLENCE IN THE BLACK COMMUNITY

THE ROLE OF LAW ENFORCEMENT IN DOMESTIC VIOLENCE FATALITY REVIEW

This workshop will discuss how law enforcement can enhance the work of a fatality review team. The presenter will specifically cover the dangers posed to first responders by abusers who choose to go lethal, how investigations can flush out the red flags of lethality and use that information to identify dangerous individuals in our communities and how law enforcement sets the stage for a productive domestic violence death review.

ROUTERS & WIFI SECURITY (LUNCH SESSION)

This workshop will provide instructions on how to secure your router and change your Domain Name Server settings to one that is configurable and will allow you to prevent people from accessing various pornography sites, gambling sites, etc. The presenter will also discuss how to limit what devices can access the Internet through your network and see what devices are connected to a network at any given time.

SAFETY PLANNING OPEN FORUM (LUNCH SESSION) +

Safety planning is a critical component in working with victims of violent crimes, and there is no one size fits all plan for every victim. SEIZING & ANALYZING MOBILE DEVICES

This workshop will provide the first responder, investigator, and investigative supervisor with information to improve their capacity to conduct digital evidence preservation, collection, and analysis and to provide a better understanding of the role this type of digital evidence plays in the investigation. Attendees will learn how to properly seize, protect, and obtain analysis of these devices.

SHIFTING TO PREVENTION (LUNCH SESSION)

Kimberly Dickman

Everyone says they are working on prevention, but are you really? Prevention is different than awareness, it's different than response, and it's different than risk reduction. This session will examine the shift that needs to happen when we focus on preventing sexual and interpersonal violence.

THE SILENT GRAYING AGE: HOW CAN THE FORENSIC NURSE GIVE THE ELDERLY VICTIM A VOICE? +

This workshop will educate attendees on the aging process and how those factors can impact an examination and/or interviewing techniques. It will explain how previous history, culture, and social media can change an elderly victim's perception of abuse and assist the examiner to provide improved care to elderly victims.

In this workshop, law enforcement will learn how to best utilize Snapchat data for their investigations, as well as how to encourage users to stay safe on the app.

SOVEREIGNTY, CASELOAD, & EGO: ADDRESSING CIVILIAN VS. MILITARY CROSS-JURISDICTIONAL ISSUES +

Military personnel committing crimes off post. Civilian family members victimized on base. It may seem like chaos when military and civilian criminal justice worlds collide, but this cross-jurisdictional workshop will provide attendees a comprehensive, analytical framework for deciding who can, and should, take the case.

STAGES OF CHANGE THROUGH THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM

This workshop will explore how we can most effectively work with survivors as they move through the criminal justice system and their own "stages of change", based on the Transtheoretical Model of Change: precontemplation, contemplation, preparation, action, maintenance, and termination. The presenters will discuss victims' thoughts regarding their ability to change based on what "stage" they are in and how this can affect everything from the first report to the trial and beyond.

STRATEGIC COLLABORATION: WORKING TOGETHER TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE +

Collaboration; everyone says they want to do it, but few succeed at it. This workshop will define collaboration, examine the hurdles faced when teams come together, and offer steps one can take to improve their personal collaborative skills and create a culture of collaborative engagement.

STRATEGIC PROSECUTION OF STRANGULATION-RELATED CRIMES +

This workshop will explore how to strategically prosecute strangulation offenders by providing tips on jury selection and trial approaches. The presenter will discuss the overlap with sex crimes, effectiveness of prosecuting with a trauma-informed perspective, and how to recruit and develop medical experts. Finally, this workshop will discuss how to overcome common defenses such as lack of external visible injury, rough sex, and "if she could talk she could breathe."

SUFFER FROM BURNOUT? GIVE 'EM THE F.I.N.G.E.R.!

The unhappiness and detachment burnout causes can threaten jobs, relationships, and health. In this workshop, attendees will learn the definition and symptoms of burnout while laughing and learning how to apply the presenter's F.I.N.G.E.R. philosophy to help themselves and their co-workers avoid and/or recover from burnout.

SUPERVISING SEX OFFENDERS

SUPPORTING IMMIGRANT SURVIVORS OF VIOLENCE & PROMOTING COMMUNITY SAFETY THROUGH A MULTI-AGENCY COORDINATED RESPONSE +

This workshop will share different practices available to help immigrant survivors from diverse backgrounds obtain safety and legal protections. The presenters will demonstrate how diverse stakeholders are able to work together to ensure that immigrant survivors who have experienced gender-based violence are able to access vital protections, such as Special Immigrant Juvenile Status, U visas, T visas, VAWA, and asylum.

SUPPORTING OUR SISTERS THROUGH POLICY, PRACTICE, & PRAYER: THE PLIGHT OF BLACK WOMEN

This workshop will explore the challenges and barriers Black survivors experience when accessing services and justice from the criminal and civil legal system. Internal barriers and external barriers for Black survivors have real consequences on their safety, autonomy, and self-reliance. Attendees will discuss solutions and strategies that may facilitate help seeking by Black survivors.

SURVIVOR DRIVEN PATHS TO JUSTICE, RECOVERY, & GRADUATION

Having worked with survivors from the eight colleges and universities in D.C., the presenters have seen first-hand the importance of a coordinated effort with all of the stakeholders in college student's health and well-being. TACKLING INSTITUTIONALIZED INDIFFERENCE: LESSONS FOR SART LEADERS FROM RECENT INVESTIGATIONS +

Specifically, what are the results of the first-ever investigation of a prosecutor's office? TAKE OUT THE DRAMA, BRING IN THE TRAUMA: HOW TO CONVERT CHALLENGES INTO CONVICTIONS +
